## Nation-Wide Law

Dominion prohibition was debated at length, and it was decided that the enactment of a complete nation-wide law should be urged upon the new government and parliament and also that the members elect should be interviewed regarding the matter. The general feeling was that the next logical step in the prohibition reform was national prohibition and that the passing of such a law would not only make enforcement of provincial pro hibition easier but would induce the good feeling between the provinces of Canada and national unity, while the present sectional laws were causing interprovincial ill will, strike and antagonism.

The gathering was one of the most successful and helpful of the many county conventions that have been held and showed that the prohibition forces are not included to rest on their oars but are in fine fighting fettle.
