LOYAL ORANGE ASSOCIATION, B.N.A.-The regular annual meeting of the Right Worshipful the Grand Lodge of this important and powerful body took place in the Grand Jury Room (Lynd's Hotel, Court House Square), Hamilton, on Tuesday, the 18th inst, and two following days; and, we are informed, was one of the most important ever held. The attendance was numerons; delegates being present as usual from Amherstburgh, Montreal, and other far-off portions of the Province. We are informed that during the past year the labours of George Benjamin, Esq., G.
