THE POPE ON ENGLAND.—Very recently an English deputation waited upon the Holy Father, to tender their respectful thanks for the honor due to their country by the elevation of Mgr. Howard to the Cardinalate. The deputation, in order not to in-convenience His Holiness, was limited to a small convenience His Holiness, was limited to a small number, of whom the following were the chief, namely:—Lord Beaumont, Hon William Maxwell, Mr. Hunter Blair, the Very Rev. Dr. Henry O'Callaghan, Rector of the English College; Very Rev. D. Spencer Northcote, President of Oscott; Rev. S. Sole, Professor at Oscott; Rev. R. Mount, Southampton; Rev. William Tylee, Rev. Joseph Stevenson, Mr. Youngman, Mr. Chatte, Mr. Moorat, Mr. Lindsay, Mr. Hartwell Grissell, Mr. Winchester, Mr. Hutchinson, etc. The Pope received the deputation in his private library. After the members had been in his private library. After the members had been severally introduced by Mgr. Stoner, the address of the deputation, written in French by Mgr. de Stacpoole, was read by him before the Pope. His Holiness made a reply in Italian. He said that his affection for England was caused not by her enormous material wealth, nor by her amazing political influence, nor by the magnitude of her fleet, but by the work which she had been the instrument of performing in spreading the knowledge of the faith over the globe. English Catholics were the instrument of planting the standard of the Cross in distant lands. For the English Protestants, those, that is, who were honest Protestants, he entertained sentiments of respect. For the conversion of England he had always prayed, commending that nation especially to St. Gregory the Great. He mentioned the fervent zeal of the Passionist Father Spencer, and spoke of Lord Palmerston and his times. In former years he was reminded of England by a normer years ne was reminded or England by a monastery he used at one time to visit which was near Faenza; and had an Englishman, St. Magloire, for its founder. That God had heard the prayers which were offered for the conversion of England might be gathered from the fact that an enormous increase in the number of Catholics had taken place in that country. The conversions were extraordin-ary, and he had been enabled to effect the restoration of the hierarchy, and to remedy in part the evils of centuries. He spoke of the Cardinals he had already centuries. He spoke of the Cardinals he had already created for the British Empire, namely Cardinals Wiseman, Cullen, and Manning, and he alluded to a fourth English-speaking Cardinal, Archbishop McCloskey. In appointing Mgr. Howard to the Sacred College he had, he trusted, done an act which was pleasing to English Catholics, and also to many English Protestants, who were glad at the elevation of a countryman. To the English aristocracy the appointment would be agreeable, as Mgr. Howard belonged to one of the noblest families in England, and was nearly related to the Duka of in England, and was nearly related to the Duke of Norfolk. His Holiness then thanked the members of the deputation for their expressions of satisfaction and goodwill, and gave the Apostolic Benediction. At the termination of the audience the Pope presented Lord Beaumont with his own palm.

Sacrilegious Poisoners.—The Archbishep of Quito was poisoned on Good Friday while saying Mass, by means of strychnine introduced into the wine used in the ceremony; there was great excitement and indignation over the sacrilege. The perpetrators have not been discovered.
