- Mr. Martin P. O'Connell (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Regional Economic Expansion): 1. No. Discussions concerning possible assistance for selected mineral development activities in Newfoundland are underway between the Province and the federal Departments of Regional Economic Expansion and Energy, Mines and Resources.
  - 2. No.
- 3. As part of a possible mineral development program for Newfoundland, consideration is being given to federal financial assistance for geological examinations of industrial mineral deposits.
  - 4. No.
- 5. Under the Atlantic Provinces Surveying, Mapping and Land Registration Program, the Department of Regional Economic Expansion is assisting the Province of Newfoundland to map Crown Land Boundaries, establish second order control and undertake large scale mapping of certain urban areas. The Province is responsible for land registration and land titles systems.
- 6. This will depend on the results of current discussions about a possible program for Newfoundland.

# CANADIAN ARMED FORCES—RECRUITMENT STANDARDS

## Question No. 1,166-Mr. Forrestall:

- 1. In the recruitment program of the Armed Forces (a) what education levels are being requested (b) what degree of technical skill is demanded (c) what is being done specifically to attract recruits at such educational levels and with such skills?
- 2. Do the Armed Forces make extra demands of military tradesmen as compared to industry and, if so, are such extra demands compensated for accordingly and in what manner?
- Hon. Donald S. Macdonald (Minister of National Defence): 1. (a) Normally, a minimum of Grade 8 or equivalent. (b) For entry as an unskilled recruit appropriate aptitude tests are given to determine suitability to undergo training in trades that are open to recruiting. Skilled applicants must possess the technical skills that are in demand. (c) A continuous national and local advertising program, through press and radio; mobile recruiting teams providing information to the local populace and educational institutions; and conducting tours to various military installations for School Guidance Counsellors.
- 2. Yes, members of the Canadian Forces, under operational conditions, work long hours in adverse climatic conditions and are subject to moves, often at very short notice, to meet temporary emergencies or requirements. For servicemen serving in certain environments and under certain hazardous conditions, allowances are payable to attract, retain and compensate, whilst others have it built into their rate of pay.
