Question No. 1,420—**Mr. Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre):**

1. What has been the total cost of printing the 1972 income tax forms and the materials sent out therewith?
2. What has been the total cost of advertising, publicity and promotion in connection with the 1972 income tax forms?

Hon. Robert Stanbury (Minister of National Revenue): Mr. Speaker, in so far as the Department of National Revenue, Taxation, is concerned the answer is: 1. The estimated total cost is \$1,798,000.

***PHARMACEUTICAL EXPERIMENTS WITH PENITENTIARY INMATES**

Question No. 1,490—**Mr. Howard:**

1. Have penitentiary inmates ever been used to test newly developed pharmaceuticals or for any other medical experimentation and, if so, what are the details thereof?
2. Are penitentiary inmates currently used to test newly developed pharmaceuticals or for any other medical experimentation and, if so, what are the details thereof?

Hon. Warren Allmand (Solicitor General): 1. The following medical experiments have, in the past, been carried out in Canadian penitentiaries: (a) In 1968 a study of the "Absorption of Aspirin" was carried out as a joint project by the Food and Drug Directorate and by a professor of pharmacology from Queens' University at Collins Bay Institution. (b) A trial of "Mogodon versus Placebo" was carried out at Joyceville Institution in December 1967. (c) A study on "Chromosomal Abnormalities" was conducted by Dr. G. D. Scott, Regional Psychiatrist, Ontario, in association with the Faculty of Medicine at Queen's University. (d) A study in "Psychopathy and Its Physiological Correlates" was conducted by Dr. D. Craigen, Director, Medical Services, in association with the Department of Psychology at the University of British Columbia. (e) A number of brief trials of various drugs were carried out in Archambault Institution by the Institute of Bio-Endocrinology in August 1971 and on six occasions during 1972. The number of inmates involved ranged from ten to 18. (f) In 1968 and again in 1972, Hoffman-La Roche, in co-operation with Dr. Harris, a physician employed by the penitentiary service, conducted studies on the blood levels of Valium and penicillin. On both occasions 20 inmates were involved. (g) A study on "Chromosomal Abnormalities" was conducted by Dr. Welch of Dalhousie University in 1969. In all of the above cases, the inmates' participation was on a completely voluntary basis and they were free to withdraw from the research at any time they wished. The inmates were well informed of the nature of the research in advance. Under no circumstances would authority be given for a procedure to be employed which would, in any way, be hazardous or detrimental to an inmate.

2. The only medical research currently being conducted is a study on "Chromosomal Abnormalities" in the Ontario region.

POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT—INSTALLATION OF NEW POSTAL CODE

Question No. 1,544—**Mr. Dinsdale:**

1. What is the estimated saving to the Post Office Department from the installation of the new postal code?
2. What are the reasons for the saving?
3. How many postal employees have been replaced by the automated system?

Hon. André Ouellet (Postmaster General): 1. Savings over 17 years, beginning in 1971, were estimated at \$134,000,000 (discounted dollars).

2. Savings will occur as a result of changes in future hiring patterns and increased efficiency in the department.

CBC—REVENUE FROM TELEVISION ADVERTISING

Question No. 1,659—**Mr. Knight:**

1. What were the annual revenues of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation from television advertising for the years 1965 to 1972 inclusive?
2. In each year 1965 to 1972 inclusive, what percentage of that amount was spent by Kraft Foods from CBC television advertising?

Hon. James Hugh Faulkner (Secretary of State): I am informed by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation as follows: 1. 1964-65, \$30,537,000; 1965-66, \$31,145,000; 1966-67, \$32,939,000; 1967-68, \$36,265,000; 1968-69, \$37,548,000; 1969-70, \$44,881,000; 1970-71, \$42,851,000; 1971-72, \$46,710,000.

2. It has not been customary to require the CBC to disclose amounts spent by individual advertisers since such information could adversely affect the Corporation in its business relationships.

LIST OF CANADIAN FORCES AND PUBLIC SERVICE ELECTORS

Question No. 1,684—**Mr. Nesdoly:**

Is a Member of Parliament entitled to obtain a list of the names and addresses of persons who were registered in his constituency and voted overseas in the last Federal Election and (a) if so (i) in what manner may the information be obtained (ii) to whom must the request be made (b) if not, for what reason?

Mr. John M. Reid (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council): I am informed by the Chief Electoral Officer as follows: It is assumed that the list referred to is the list of Canadian Forces and Public Service electors forwarded by the respective co-ordinating officers of the Departments of National Defence and External Affairs to the Chief Electoral Officer pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 37(5)(c) of the Special Voting Rules for onward transmission to returning officers during a federal election on accordance with the provisions of subsection 28(2) of the Canada Elections Act. The provisions of subsection 28(2) of the Act limit the availability of these lists to the period of a federal general election.
