Munro (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): Madam Speaker, if the hon. member would like to see the whole history of federal government expenditure in the Northwest Territories which has reached up into the hundreds of millions this year, and in past years, and how it breaks down with respect to infrastructure, I would be more than happy to send it to him. If the hon. member would like to see what commitments there are in terms of what will be necessary in the future for development—when that development takes place—I will be more than happy to show him that. If he thinks that during the question period I can indicate every road which requires construction, the hon. member knows—

EXTERNAL AFFAIRS

COMPOSITION OF FUTURES SECRETARIAT

Miss Pauline Jewett (New Westminster-Coquitlam): Madam Speaker, my question is directed to the Secretary of State for External Affairs. While commending the minister on the appointment of the Hon. David MacDonald as president of the newly established futures secretariat, I cannot understand why, of the 27 directors, eight are from Toronto, six are from Ottawa, and five are from Montreal. In effect 70 per cent are from the Ottawa-Toronto-Montreal axis. Only one director is from British Columbia. Is it the minister's view that British Columbians are incapable of engaging in public education on the problems of the developing world, or is it simply a case, once again, of ignoring British Columbia?

Hon. Mark MacGuigan (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Madam Speaker, the explanation for both parts of the hon. member's question is the same, namely, that this is an independent, non-governmental organization for which I can only take credit for having inspired. The choice of Mr. MacDonald as the president was made independently, and the choice of directors was made independently. I can tell the hon. member that I did hear from the president, in a report last week, that the secretariat did expect to enlarge the board of directors, and that it had begun with this board to get the operation going as quickly as possible.

Miss Jewett: Madam Speaker, the figures I gave include the enlargement. I just received word today that those are the figures. If, indeed, this new futures secretariat thinks so little of the rest of the country, it already discourages me. The minister, at least, could have suggested that it have a better representation. However, let me move on to a related question.
