PRESENCE IN GALLERY OF HON. JOHN NAPIER TURNER, LEADER OF LIBERAL PARTY OF CANADA

Hon. Allan J. I would like to say to those who were not successful that I have some knowledge of how it fells. You heal. It takes time. Each of you conducted magnificent campaigns.

I watched with great interest from an unusual vantage point. Having been a politician for most of my adult life, I had always thought that only those of us in political life had to find things to say when there was little left to say, for long periods of time at a stretch. However, I sat among the press over the course of Friday night and Saturday. There were long stretches when little was happening that could usefully be commented upon, except to say that the end result appeared to be inevitable.

I would like to say to Jean Chrétien in particular, who is not here, that his campaign carried with it a great deal of emotion which I think many people in the country felt throughout the campaign. His campaign served him well, and will make him a politician in the hearts of Canadians for a long time to come.
