

"During Advent Mr. Hoadley delivered a course of lectures on the 'History and Doctrines of the Church.'

"At the other Stations similar work was performed.

"Beaufort is a Station of peculiar interest, many of the settlers coming from St. John. There are about 14 Church families at this Station, the great majority are very poor. Until winter the services were held regularly every month. When winter set in the barn in which service had been held was found too cold, and there being no suitable house, the services were necessarily very irregular. The attendance at the service was always very good. This Station is indebted to the very great kindness of the Church people in St. John for much valuable aid. The ladies in connection with the Church of England Institute collected and sent to the settlement about \$100 worth of second-hand and new clothing, books, &c., for the settlers. Mr. W. M. Jarvis, and others, contributed to the same object. On the last evening of the old year the children of the Settlement were privileged to enjoy a large Christmas Tree, loaded with useful and beautiful articles, kindly sent by Mrs. Carr and Mrs. G. Matthew of St. John. The Settlement is also indebted to Mrs. Carr, Mrs. Matthew, Mrs. Walker, Mrs. Keator, and Mr. W. M. Jarvis, for their great kindness in giving Parlor Concerts towards a sum to put up a School Chapel in the Settlement. About \$100 has been realized, and is now on deposit in the Savings Bank.

"This Station is much indebted to W. B. Mills, Esq., for his ready co-operation and valuable aid in all Church matters in this Settlement.

"On the Festival of the Circumcision 12 children were baptized at Beaufort, two of whom were shortly after called to their rest.

"It is gratifying to know that the Children and Teachers of St. John's Sunday School, of which Mr. C. F. Kinnear is Superintendent, have decided to aid the Mission of Aberdeen, instead of sending their contributions to distant Dioceses.

"I append to this Report the following note from Mr. Hoadley:
