The new farm is situated in Burwash Township, at a distance of 21 miles from Sudbury. It is bounded on north and south by the Canadian Pacific and Canadian Northern railways, and has spiendid facilities for stockraising. It is the expectation of the minister that with the assistance of the Fort William institution and others now planned, the 2000 cattle annually consumed in provincial institutions will be supplied entirely by the province.


