THIS DOG WORTH \$285.71 A POUND

Thousand Dollar Pomeranian Now the Subject of Lawsuit.

WAS GIVEN THE GATE Owner Claimed That Its Black Hair Had Been Dyed.

Mrs. Mildred Boylen of Westchester, N.Y., is suing Mrs. Alice M. Wiley, who keeps the "Cairndhu Kennels" at Grimsby, Ont. for the return of the \$1000 which she paid for a dog, \$600 damages and interest on her money since last April, before Justice Lennox in the non-jury assizes. After the evidence of Mrs. Boylen, the court adjourned until 10.30 this morning.

Mrs. Boylen in her evidence stated that she purchased the dog from Mrs. Wiley for \$1000 cash on the understanding that he was pure black. About two weeks after she had got him home and was grooming him, some substance came off on to her arms. She thought this was dirt, but later noticed it was his color. "I at once sent him to Mrs. Thorpe, a dog expert at Sheepshead Bay, thinking that she said, 'I was not keeping him right'."

Mrs. Thorpe showed the dog for her at the Mincos show, where he took two third prizes. In the variety class she said, he got the 'gate' which proved to be a new one on the court and she was asked to explain what she meant. She said that he was disqualified on account of being grey. She later took him to a show at Lancaster where he took two prizes, he having only one other dog to compete against.

Mrs. Wiley, in defence, stated that she had never made any false representations about the dog and that the plaintiff had inspected him before buying.
