## LUQUE KNOCKED OUT IN FIRST, WENT BACK AND WON THE SECOND

Leafs and Royals Split the Sunday Doubleheader\_\_Rochester Plays at Island Today -Scores and Records.

MONTREAL, June 18.—After being batted out of the box in the first game under a fusiliade of hits in less than three innings, the Leafs' Cuban pitcher, Luque, demanded another chance at the Royals in the second game of today's double-header. He was given the opportunity, and held the locals to mine hits, and beat them, 6 to 4. The Royals won the first game, 17 to 9, smothering three Leaf twirlers with hits. Luque yielded five for seven runs in less than three innings. Cook lasted three and a third, giving eight hits and the same number of runs and Cocreham finished out, being the only pitcher of the trio to hold the Royals to a scoreless innings. He was touched for only a brace of runs during his stay on the hill. There was terrific hitting on both sides in the opener, the rough grounds making the infielders' jobs difficult. The Leafs had thirteen hits from Bullet Miller's offerings, as against the Royals' eighteen, including two home runs by Ray Demmitt. Smith and Holden of the locals also amassed four-sack clouts, Smith being the big hitter of the fray, with three doubles and a single in addition to his homer. There were all kinds of freak baserunning, the Royals twice scoring with double-steals.

The Leafs went into the lead early in the second game, Trout's homer in the second session sending Parent over ahead of him, while Hollander singled and scored on a single by Kelly and a sacrifice fly by Luque. The Royals got a pair in the third, Richter and Smith walking and scoring on Holden's long triple. The Leafs added another by timely hitting in the fourth, Pitcher Richter's offerings holding no terror for them. Royals made a big rally in the ninth, pushing two runs across, but sharp fielding behind Luque saved the day. The Leafs won Saturday's game handly by a score of 10 to 1. Koestner, a Pacific Coast pitcher, was making his local debut, and the Leafs threw a pall on the proceedings by pounding him out of the box in favor of Richter, who came considerably too late to save the Special to The Toronto World.
