To render the whole more plain and intelligible, it feems proper, previously to mention his Majesty's undoubted Right to those Territories that the *French* have been and are now invading, and fortifying themselves upon; and to give a fuccinct Account of the Encroachments they have made fince the Treaty of *Utrecht*, and the later one of *Aix-la-Chapelle*, with fome other occasional Remarks. *Sebastian Cabot*, who failed from *England*, with a Commission from *Henry* VII. first discovered the northern Continent of *America*, in 1497; and took Possession of it for that Monarch.

It is needlefs to take Notice of what particular Parts of this Continent the French have fince at different Times poffeffed themfelves, which have been afterwards confirmed to them by. Treaty; or to afcertain the exact Boundaries of all his Britannic Majesty's Territories in North-America.

It will be sufficient for the present Purpose, to observe, that the Province of Nova Scotia or Acadia, was first granted by King James I. under certain determinate Bounds.

That the French were afterwards in Possession of it; that during the Time of their Possession, they understood the Limits to extend every Way as far at least as those described in King James's Grant.

That at the Negotiation for the Treaty of Utrecht it was expressly infifted upon by the French King, that Acadia extended westward of St. John's River. That
