AUTOMOBILE SHOW

By Wednesday Next All Will Be in Readiness for the Opening.

By next Wednesday all the work at the armories in preparation for Toronto's sixth annual auto show will have been completed, and everything will be in readiness for the formal opening in the evening. Mr. H. West, the electrician in charge, who is working with Mr. Trahan, the decorator, to make the building as beautiful as possible, says that while there is a tremendous lot of work to be done, his men are all experts and there is no doubt but that everything will be ready. Working away up in the roof of the immense hall, they are installing several wiring systems for the large illuminated Union Jack, which will cover the ceiling, and their work is to some extent very risky. Hundreds of yards of bunting are being arranged around the walls, and the flooring, which in the riding school and the addition had to be specially constructed for the occasion, will be covered with a dark green carpet, making a most suitable background for the dark bodies of the hundreds of cars.

There has of late years been some discussion as to the real value of automobile shows. A few people contend that the need for these passed some years ago. But their value is recognized all over this continent, and Canadian as well as American dealers are very enthusiastic over the coming show in this city. From the eastern end of Canada reports are coming in that large numbers of people are heading for Toronto for the week of Feb. 21 to 28. The dealers are writing that so many of their customers are going to be present at the show that it makes their attendance there a necessity. From western points, as well as from the north and south, many others are coming, and that all former attendance records will be broken is an assured fact.

A new track for the harness horses is a probability in the near future for Toronto. The matter was favorably discussed last night at the annual meeting of the Dufferin Driving Club at Burns & Sheppard's Repository, during the progress of the annual meeting.

One member of those present were favorably inclined to the proposition. A plot of 22 acres up Yonge street is under option at a reasonable figure. Negotiations will be continued towards the organization of a joint stock company to build and operate a half-mile track for the exclusive use of the trotters and pacers.
