Montreal, Jan, 13.—In a reversal of form from their previous contest in Montreal, the Ottawa hockey team suffered a serious defeat from the Canadiens at the Jubilee rink here Saturday night, the score being 9 to 4 in fayor of the Frenchmen even tho the visitors were strengthened by having the services of Ritchie last night. In checking and speed the Canadiens had the Ottawa hockeyists faded from the start, and the latter were on the defensive most of the game. 


