Paris, Dec. 25.—The allied governments have decided against further intervention in Russia, at least for the present, according to indications from fficial circles. Great Britain and the United States, it is represented, while ecognizing that Russia should be assisted in a way to permit her getting back to normal conditions, point out that military intervention on a large scale would involve difficulties and dangers of all kinds.

Stephen Pichon, the French foreign minister, explained the situation at ngth to the committee on foreign relations yesterday. He said the solution at present favored was to guarantee moral support to the governments which have sprung up at various points on Russian and Siberian territory.
