BEN SPENCE APPEAL AGAIN POSTPONED

The appeal of Rev. Ben Spence, who was fined \$50 by Magistrate Kingsford for an alleged breach of an order-in-council, came up before Judge Morison in the county court for argument yesterday. R. H. Green, who appeared for the crown, objected to the appeal being heard in the county court, as he argued that the order-in-council provided for no right of appeal.

W. E. Raney, K.C., who appeared for the appellant, said that he had the right of appeal under the common law, but Mr. Green said that he had not in that court.

His honor finally postponed argument on the appeal until a date to be named, to give Mr. Raney a chance to further consider the objection raised by the crown counsel as to the jurisdiction of the court.

G. W. V. A. SESSION WILL BE EPOCHAL

Dominion Convention Will
Judge Loughheed — Cham-
pion Open Membership.

The Vancouver convention of the G. W. V. A., which is to be held on Monday to Saturday next week, will be the most historic and epochal of any yet held by the association. It will perhaps mean the life or death of the association. The greatest questions under discussion will be that of open-door membership and that of the 25,000 gratuity. It was stated by a large number of members in Toronto yesterday that the action of the government in granting pension increases of only twenty per cent, had practically decided a unanimous convention vote for the gratuity. The case of Sir James Loughheed, at present minister of the department of the G. W. V. A., whose dismissal is requested by many returned men, will be dealt with in detail. ADJUSTMENT OF GRATUITIES.

Dealing with the enlargement of the war gratuities to include both the men who reached only Britain and those who reached no point east of Newfoundland the Canadian department of militia has sent out the following order: "Application for adjustment of war service gratuity in the case of the land forces should be made to the assistant director of pay services of the district by which post-discharge pay was paid, or if not post-discharge pay was paid, in which the officer or soldier was retired or discharged. The necessary forms may be obtained from the military headquarters of each district." It is understood that forms of application will be distributed in Toronto on and after Wednesday, July 2.

STRIKE STOPPED MEETING.

The grand central executive of the G. W. V. A., which was to have held session at Parkdale G. W. V. A. offices last night, did not meet owing to the lack of proper transportation facilities induced thru the street railway strike.

VETERAN BURIED.

The remains of the late Gunner McKenna, brother of Dr. W. F. McKenna or Sheffield, were laid to rest yesterday at Prospect Cemetery with true military honors. Comrade Spriggs of Central G. W. V. A. had charge of the funeral arrangements. Gunner McKenna, it will be recalled, died very suddenly at his residence, 125 Dundas street.

POSTAL EMPLOYEES WILL GET DOMINION DAY

The postoffice department of Canada, as a result of protests received from organized postal employees and against distinction being made between one branch of the service and another insofar as the observance of statutory holidays is concerned, has issued instructions directing that on the next Dominion Day, July 1, 1919, the Toronto General Postoffice and the postal station will be closed, with the exception that postage stamps will be sold at the stamp wickets, and the general delivery and registration wickets will be kept open for two hours only, namely, from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m.

There will be no delivery by letter-carrier on Dominion Day, and all outgoing mails regularly due for despatch after 12 o'clock noon, will be closed at that hour.

Two clearances only will be made from the street letter boxes, approximately at 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

PROUDFOOT INTERVIEWS SIR WILLIAM HEARST

W. Proudfoot, K.C., M.L.A., leader of the opposition in the Ontario legislature, had a lengthy interview with Sir William Hearst in the premier's office in parliament buildings, yesterday afternoon. It was not possible to gather the nature of what took place, but there can be little doubt that the new political situation created by the selection of H. H. Horley as leader of the Liberal party in the province, would be discussed.

Mr. Dewar's recognition as leader of the opposition must await the opening of the next session of the legislature, when the Speaker will doubtless do the needful.

Towards the close of last session the house generously granted a seasonal allowance of \$5000 to the leader of the opposition, this being in addition to the ordinary indemnity as a member. It is not considered likely that there will be another session at Queen's Park this year, so that Mr. Dewar must perform wait until 1920 before he tastes the high financial sweets of his new position. It has been more or less authoritatively stated, however, that the Liberal party in Ontario will repudiate its allowance as not being in accord with its principles. Time will tell.

FIVE BOLSHEVISTS INVOKE HABEAS CORPUS

In an effort to invoke habeas corpus proceedings on behalf of five of the 13 alleged Bolsheviks who were sentenced to various terms by Magistrate Kingsford, J. G. O'Donoghue appeared before Justice Maestri at Osgoode Hall yesterday.

Mr. O'Donoghue based his plea on the fact that the men were arrested on June 1 in a room on Queen street, and that a trial of some of them was held on June 10. Some of the printed matter of alleged objectionable character was put in on this day as exhibits, but after the trial of the first accused the evidence as to the exhibits was dispensed with. Counsel also claims that his clients were sentenced on June 19, were sentenced without the formality of a trial. Judgment was deferred.
