

War Trophies Lend New Note to Canada's Greatest Spectacle.

GUNS AND PICTURES

Grim Memorials Abound of Dominion's Share in Mighty Victory.

"Greater than ever" is the motto that without fear of cavil or contradiction might be flung out from every roof-top and tower of the buildings of Toronto's great annual exhibition.

their great stretches of green and brilliant beds of flowers, but it will not be long before a new note reaches him in the shape of a great gun placed in front of the statue of Canada. The inscription on it tells that it was captured by the 46th Canadian Infantry Battalion, Nov. 1, 1918.

Before entering the old educational building, which has been given over to the war trophies, a big gun attracts attention. It was taken from Russia by the Germans who used it against the British. Afterwards it was captured by the Canadians at Vimy Ridge and later used against the Germans, finding its way by this circuitous route to the National Exhibition.

countless things that make up the exhibition grounds is the first taken by the Canadians at Ypres and later presented by King George who generously returned it to Canada. Three years were spent by Dr. Doughty in collecting the trophies, the intention being to place the greater part in the museum to be erected by the government and the remainder distributed amongst the different cities and towns of the Dominion.

Art Collection. Wonderfully gripping is the art collection, the Canadian section being found this year in the applied art building, and it is the prospectus of those who know that Canada has never been presented even from an artistic standpoint as well as in the present view. Thrills will go thru many a heart as the spectator looks upon "Canada's Answer," in the shape of a number of warships breasting the wave on their way to the help of the Motherland, or at the sight of the great canvas showing the arrival of the 1st contingent in France, the pipers proudly leading, the men in khaki crowding behind, and the French peasants bowed in thankfulness showing in the forefront, Edgar Buddy in the artist. Most graphic is the canvas of Byam Shaw named "Sacrifice," the upper half showing the militant portion of humanity and the lower, the waiting, watching, working women, over all the figure as the crucified Christ on the cross.

Soldier Artists. Four soldier artists have pictures, which owe their realism to the fact that their makers were themselves overseas, and saw the things they painted. The men in question are Captain Horanman Varley, who has won distinct recognition from the Royal Academy; Captain Bayly, Captain A. J. Jackson and Captain Maurice Cullen. A work that will doubtless attract much attention is an oil portrait of the Indian Chief Brant, from the brush of Romney, valued at 5,000 guineas. The large collection of war prints, which are colored, and exhibit almost every phase of the war, are a study of captivating interest. Sergt. Earle is in charge.

What the government is doing to develop the resources of Canada is shown in a special way in the sheep and goat division, in charge of J. A. Teller. A set of buildings are in course of erection, the first being a very attractive office, where information will be given freely to all inquirers, the remaining buildings being for the demonstration of the best modern ways of treating wool, and the contrasting of poor methods of shearing on many farms. Here sheep will be subjected to every process used from the time they come to the "grades" until they reach the producer. Goals will come in for a larger share of attention than on any previous occasion. It being the intention to demonstrate the value of the milk goat and its product to a community at present in ignorance as to the treatment of the animal and of the richness of its milk.

CHALLENGES Y.W.C.A. TO PROVE STATEMENT

Following up the statement to The World made on Saturday that she was refused clothing, shelter or aid by the Centre Island Y. W. C. A. after she had rescued her own child from the lake, Mrs. T. A. Giles, 52 Brownline avenue, makes the following affirmation: "I declare under the most solemn oath that the only assistance offered me at the Y. W. C. A. Rest Home, Centre Island, on Aug. 11, when I went and asked for help to get dry, was the opportunity to sit in the garden and dry my clothes. I was not given the chance to refuse a gas stove. I never mentioned a coal fire. I always use gas and thought everybody else would. Not a thread of dry clothes was offered me. I was not at all strange. My hair and hat were not disarranged and I did not say I had fallen into the water. "I should be glad to take one of the officials of the Y. W. C. A. with one of The World reporters to the home of the lady who so kindly helped me, where four other ladies spoke to me and helped to find dry clothes to put on. My friends who were with me would soon prove that I was anything but very strange in my behavior."

BUILDING LOAN HOUSES ON WEBB AVENUE

A permit has been issued at the city hall to the Toronto Housing Company for the erection of thirty-two pairs of semi-detached brick veneer and stucco dwellings on Webb avenue, near Burnmerry road. The cost is placed at \$118,900.

NO MORE MONEY TILL HOUSE CLEANED

"A housecleaning has been badly needed in the building department of the board of education," declared Mayor Church in commenting on the report of Mr. Justice Lennox. "The department," he continued, "has been a sink-hole for the people's money for years, expensive sites and expensive schools. Not another dollar will be handed over to the board of education until there is a housecleaning in the building department. Why has this housecleaning been delayed? Are they going to whitewash the officials and promote them, like they did before? The people should be asked to vote next January on the question of the city council revising the estimates of the board of education. "In my opinion the whole board of education should be reorganized. There should be a board of control of five to administer the schools in the whole city. Another thing, I am going to move that there be one building department for the city and outside bodies, such as the board of education."

JAIL FOR MOTORIST.

Fifty dollars and costs and seven days in jail was the sentence imposed yesterday morning in police court upon Austin Foreham, when he pleaded guilty of driving a car while under the influence of liquor. On a second charge, one of criminal negligence, the prisoner will appear in court next week.

BOOTLEGGERS FINED.

Jake Taskula was fined \$300 and costs of four months at the Jail Farm, when he was found guilty in police court yesterday morning of selling alcohol.

FOREST FIRES DESTROY HOMES OF SETTLERS

J. H. White, assistant provincial forester, said yesterday that he was still without information with regard to the forest fire in the Owen Sound district, although he had wired Harry May, chief fire ranger in the district, to ascertain the correctness or otherwise of the published reports to the effect that the Deer Lake settlers had been wiped out. The department has received word of a number of small fires between Parry Sound and Deer Lake, in which only government property threatened is abandoned, and cut-over limits. Several settlers' buildings near Deer Lake were destroyed, but the owners and all their effects were moved to a place of safety.

EMPLOYEES PICNIC.

The employees of the Brunswick-Balke-Collender Co. of Canada, Limited, held their first annual picnic at Grimsby Beach Saturday. More than four hundred of the employees and their wives and families took in the trip and a very enjoyable time was spent. There were 22 events on the sports program and handsome prizes were presented to the winners.
