Cabat's Original Idea. Miss Mickle's paper, which showed much study and research, began by showing that the original idea of John Cabot was to discover a short route to India, and how tals was the problem of the age. Vennce was the then mistress of the seas and did the carrying trade of the world. She described the methods, of transportation of the immense trade of the east in the sixteenth century. Two books had just appeared, which set the world agog with the news of the far-away Cathay. One of these, toom which Miss Fitzgibbon read extracts, was "Sir John Mandeville's Travels," and the other Marco Polo's book.

Miss Mickie showed how the Spanish and Portuguese, as well as the English, were interested in the great work of discovery; how it was John Cabot, and not Columbus, who first discovered America, and how for years Schastian, the unscrupulous son, had assumed the honor of this discovery, when it was really the father who was the strong, adventurous spirit. Miss Mickie reviewed the different theories of the first landing of the Cabot expedition, showed the part which Henry VII, took in it, and how the Spaniards in England kept their Spanish Majesties, who were ever fealous, informed of the movements in England of these voyages of discovery.

Miss Mickie's able and interesting paper was supplemented by original documents and despatches, which showed the intense interest and excitement which prevailed among the three nationalities at this time.

Miss Mackenzie read three separate contemporary accounts of Cabot's discovery—one private, the two other official despatches to the Duke of Milan. Two other despatches—one, from the then Spanish Ambassador in England to the King of Spain, the other from Pedro de Ayella—were also of great interest.

Other interesting things shown on the screen were Juan La Cosa's map of the then known world, a portrait of Sebastian Cabot, and the Cabot Tower, which has been recently erected in Bristol, England, to commemorate the name of this great discoverer. Miss Fitzgibbon said that this picture was of especial interest to women, because the tower was erected on Brandon Hill, a place which was granted to the women of Bristol, whereon to bleach their linen, by Queen Elizabeth, to compensate them for their exceeding plainness of counternance.
