CANADIAN MINING DEALS.

Properties Passing Into the Hands of English Companies.

Alumina-Kesteven Group in Rossland and Gold Coils in the Lake of the Woods

Deal on the Ottawa-Deal on in Camp McKinnon.

It is announced that a deal for the transfer of properties in Camp McKinnon, B.C., is on foot. Dr. Kimball of New York, representing English and American capital, recently visited the Cariboo mine in that camp and looked over other properties, including the Amelia, Alice, Emma and Maple Leaf claims. The Cariboo mine, mentioned is a well known, has for upwards of two years paid regular monthly dividends of from 1 to 2 per cent. In Camp McKinnon is also located the Minnehaha, a proposition owned chiefly by Ontario. The sale of the above mentioned properties goes through it will be one of the biggest contemplated in Southern British Columbia.

Bought Canadian Mines.

The London, Eng., Financial News, in a recent issue, publishes a report of the statutory meeting of the B.C. Exploration Syndicate, Col. Englewood of Ontario government concessions, occupied the chair, and the report of the managing director, Mr. J. H. Macdonald, who had acquired the Columbia-Koo group and other mines in Rossland, B.C., and that the purchase money on the Gold Coils, in the Lake of the Woods, Ont., has been already partially paid down. The Gold Coils is on Shovel Lake and lies south of the Mikado claim. The directors required a 10-drill capacity and 225 horse power boilers for operating the plant.

Yield of Two Ontario Mines.

The Mikado gold mine, according to The Montreal Star, is now producing some \$15,000 a month. The property during March yielded that amount of gold, which was deposited in the Imperial Bank at Montreal. The same paper asserts that the Mikado mine is yielding nearly \$100,000 a year.

New Mill for Regina.

The old ten-story mill on the Regina mine is to be replaced by a seven-story mill, which will have a capacity of 100,000 tons of ore annually.

THEY WANT A WHARF

On the Niagara River—Request Preferred by the Niagara Fruit Growers' Association.

A deputation from Niagara Fruit Growers' Association waited on the Government in Council yesterday afternoon and requested permission for the construction of a wharf at some point on the Niagara River between Queenston and Niagara, as a place of call for steamers. The Government heard the statements presented, and appointed 2.30 p.m. Tuesday for hearing any persons who had objections to the granting of the request.

Red Line Steamers From Halifax.

The passenger agent for the Cunard Steamship Line, Mr. A. F. Webster, received today from the company instructions to contract all reports that the Canadian steamers would, in the case of war, sail from Halifax or some ports other than the ones they are sailing from at present, namely, New York and Boston. The Canadian Line, being under the British Government as mail carriers and in the Naval Brigade, have no fear whatever of the Spanish, they believing that England will not be blockaded. The company's business is decidedly better than it was at this time last year, but they deem it advisable to have these rumors contradicted, as they have a tendency to frighten trade people.

ALL ABOUT THE SCHOOLS.

Inspector Hughes has issued his Annual Budget of Public School Statistics.

—Interesting Extracts.

Nearly bound in red linen is the concise and complete Report of the year ending Dec. 31, 1897. The interposition of blue-print photographs of the Public Schools lends an added charm to the report. The number of 32,751 were registered during the year. The average daily attendance was 21,360, a veritable army of children. November was the best month for attendance, 27,415 pupils being on the roll. Dufferin school has the largest number of pupils, 1,181. No teacher has more than 57 pupils under his or her charge, in one teacher, in Alexander Industrial school, has but 17.

Medals and Honor Certificates.

It is not generally known, but in a fact, that medals and certificates of honor are given to the pupils who have not been absent or late for whose conduct has been uniformly good. Bronze medals are awarded for conformity to the school rules for four years, silver medals for eight years and silver clasps for each year over eight years. They have been 526 certificates awarded, 180 bronze medals, 140 silver medals and 34 clasps. Byrnes and Dufferin schools lead with 354 certificates of honor. Dufferin school leads with 34 bronze medals, Dufferin is away ahead with 21 silver medals, and also is first with 7 silver clasps. Five hundred and two teachers and one hundred and sixteen kindergarten teachers the children. Two music teachers and one drill instructor do special teaching. It costs \$0.05 per pupil to teach and to furnish with supplies. Free text books cost \$1588.01 during the year, about 513 cents per pupil on the average.

At the city Model school fifty pupils obtained third-class teaching certificates. Twenty-two classes in the night schools were held during January, February, March, October, November and December, 1897. Seven hundred and sixty-five pupils were enrolled, and the total cost for tuition was \$2318.75.

Manual Training.

The report contains an essay on manual training, in which its educational and moral advantages are set forth. The stereotyped objections to this kind of training are succinctly answered. The essay concludes with the statement that manual training aims "not to make things, but to make better men and women."

The drill instructor's report shows that the school battalions muster 1617 boy soldiers.

The report contains statistical and reference tables, setting forth many interesting details of school economy.

The financial statement shows receipts of \$430,152.04 and expenditures of \$424,544.75, leaving a balance in the bank of \$5037.31. The city gives \$302,965 and the Government \$24,011.75.

Efficient and Well Paid.

The city school system has efficient officers who receive good salaries. Mr. C. H. Bishop, superintendent of buildings, draws \$2500; Mr. W. C. Wilkinson, the building secretary-treasurer, gets \$2200; Inspector Chapman's stipend is \$1850; and Inspector Hughes earns \$900.

Lead pencils, pens, penholders, slate pencils, erasers and other school supplies cost \$1205.88. Insurance premiums amounted to \$1117.25.

The superannuation allowances amounted to \$1310.33. Five hundred and sixteen dollars was spent on fuel.

An Examination for Actuaries.

The British Institute of Actuaries' annual examination was begun in the handsome Board room of the North American Life Building yesterday under supervision of Mr. A. G. Ramsey, President of the Canadian Life, Mr. W. W. Wilson, Vice-President and Director of the North American Life Company. The examination is held annually in Great Britain, the Australian colonies and at Montreal and Toronto. The candidates are sitting at the examination in Toronto, which will conclude today.
