Cooking Beets.

"Miss L. M. C." sends recipe for "delicious dish of beets and beet tops," asking for its publication. Cut the beets from the tops, leaving about an inch and a half of stalk, wash, scrub, and trim, then put in saucepan of boiling water and boil for about fifteen minutes. The beets take about twenty or thirty minutes, but beet tops only fifteen. After boiling put tops through a mincer or chop very finely, add pepper and salt and a little butter, make a little mound in the centre of a dish of the beet tops, when the beets are done, remove the skins and stalks and chop beets up finely. Season with pepper, salt and a little butter, and make a border around the beet tops of the beets.



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
