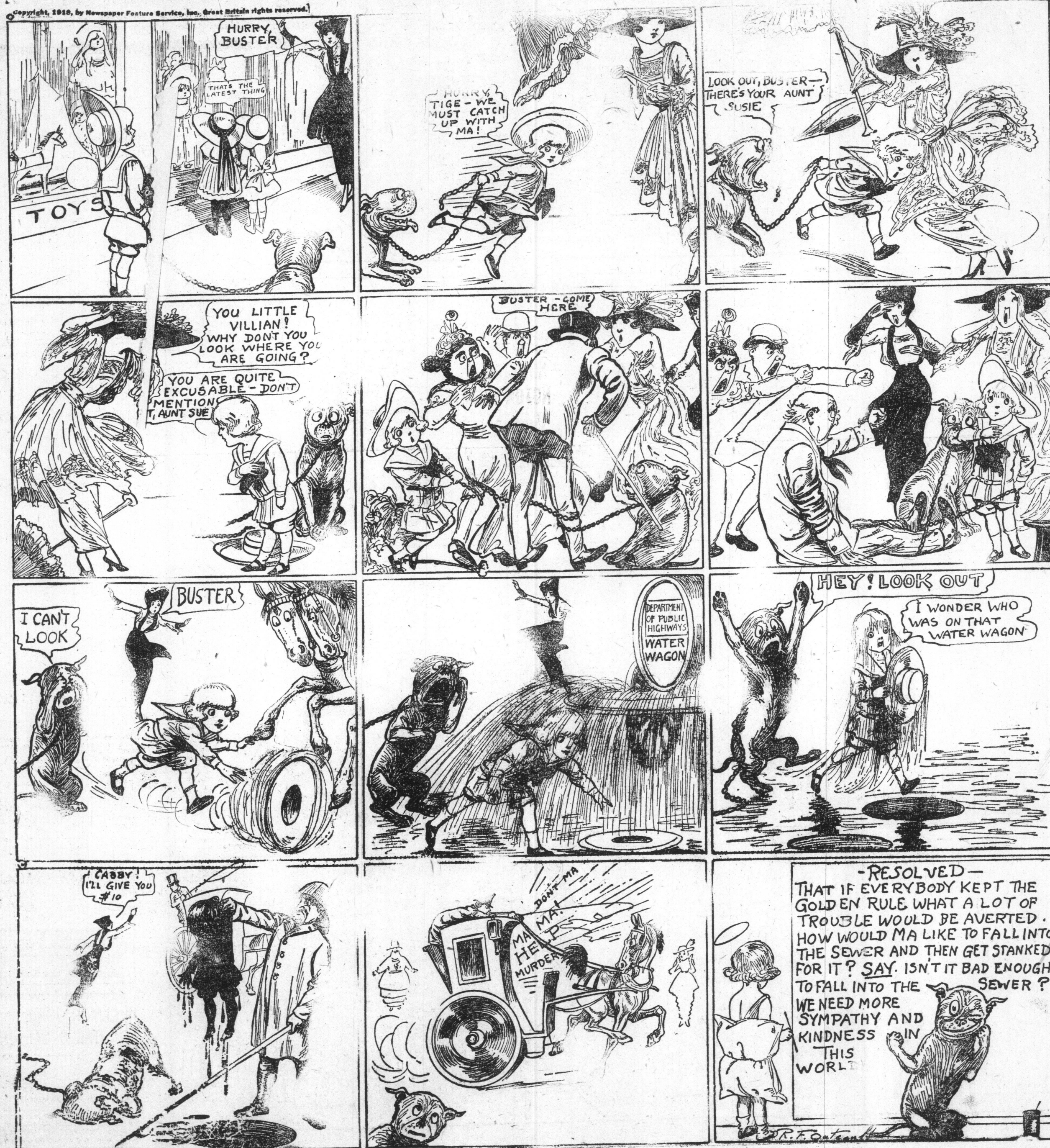




IT WAS ONE MISHAP AFTER ANOTHER



W.C.T.U. DEMANDS THAT STORED LIQUOR BE COMMANDEERED

Wants Alcohol Extracted for War Purposes.

CONSCRIPT ALIEN LABOR

Attack on Government for Putting Ban on "The Fiddlers."

OTTAWA, June 21.—That the Federal Government will be asked by the W. C. T. U. to commandeer the 12,000,000 gallons of liquor now in storage and extract the alcohol for munitions purposes was the subject of a resolution unanimously passed this afternoon at the W. C. T. U. convention. This body of women will also memorialize the Government to conscript and tabulate alien labor on a war basis, as well as the industries, this latter step to insure that the extra profits reach the Government.

Mrs. Gordon Wright, the president, speaking to the latter resolution, told of secret boasts that had been made by an alien in the west only last week to a friend of herself, and thought that there should be no delay in putting through this legislation in Canada.

Other resolutions supported the action of the Presbyterian General Assembly in its attack on the Senate for throwing out the amendments to the criminal code; another criticized the Government for putting the ban on Arthur Meier's "Fiddlers," by which it was stated Canada was placed in a most unique condition in the barring of free speech, which does not obtain in any other Christian country.

The enactments of the legislatures made for the prevention of social diseases were indorsed. Thanks to the women the franchise, a W. C. T. U. declaration to continue its temperance propaganda, a pursuance of "peaceful war" against tobacco and especially the cigarette, and a request to the legislature to prohibit the terms "beer," "bar," "wines," etc., in connection with places where drinks are sold, were among the subjects that were given hearty indorsement in resolutions.

It was decided to establish a travelers aid department in the Dominion similar to that existing in the Alberta Province. It is hoped to organize travelers aid work not only in cities, but in towns, villages and rural districts.

CANADIANS ELECTRICAL ASSOCIATION CONVENES

A. Monro Grier, K.C., of Niagara Falls, Is Elected President.

OTTAWA, June 21.—A. Monro Grier, K.C., of the Canadian Niagara Power Company, Niagara Falls, Ont., was elected president of the Canadian Electrical Association at the 15th annual meeting in the Chateau Laurier today. A number of interesting reports were submitted at the afternoon session, and a unique demonstration was given with the assistance of two linemen from the Ottawa Electric Company who were electrocuted in order that the delegates might be given an opportunity of witnessing the procedure in the method of resuscitation. The proceedings wound up tonight with a banquet in the Chateau Laurier, at which 15 persons were present.

FORMER GERMAN LINER IS SUNK IN COLLISION

Goes Down Off North Carolina—One Life Lost.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Sinking of the American steamer Schurz in collision with the German liner Florida off the North Carolina coast early today, was announced today by the navy department. One seaman was killed, but all others of the Schurz's crew were saved.

The Schurz was the former German ship Geier, of 1,600 tons, 225 feet in length.

MORE SUGAR COMING IN; ENOUGH FOR SUMMER

MONTREAL, June 21.—An official of one of the large refineries here says that the sugar situation in Canada is steadily improving and that shipments are coming to hand more freely and in larger quantities than was thought possible some time back. There will be ample for all legitimate needs, he thinks, this summer, and no shortage for preserving. While there has been an agitation for higher prices, there has been so far no serious consideration of advancing the cost of raws, and he adds that on the whole the situation is encouraging.
