"In place of the disproportionate membership payments of the old days, the modern board of trade tays to the big corporation in effect: Your larger interests in this community increase your responsibilities for its well-being. You have more at stake than the small storekerson and therefore the small storekerson and therefore the small storekerson.

Under this plan the corporation, firm or individual subscribes to a number of memberships. Since, however, the board cannot permit the plural subscribers to dominate its affairs, it allows each subscriber to have one vote only, the same as the smallest store-keeper in the organization.

"It is the custom for the subscriber to plural memberships to assign them "It is the custom for the subscriber to plural memberships to assign them to the younger men in its employ, the assignments being absolute, and carrying with them the power of one vote each. This brings into the board of trade the younger men of business. It interests them in community work early in their careers, and makes certain of the presence of men who will be the leaders in the community in a few years. leaders in the community in a rew years.

"The three-year guarantee is another outgrowth of experience. A board of trade can do much in one year, but a program of work that covers three years is vastly better than a one-year affair. To make it possible, though, the directors must know what the income is going to be. The one-
