

BRANTFORD G.W.V.A. BUYS POSTOFFICE FOR SOLDIERS' HOME

Will Spend \$75,000 On It—Plant Extension Cancelled.

BRANTFORD, Sept. 12.—The city council has authorized the sale of the old postoffice building, recently acquired from the Dominion Government, to the G. W. V. A. for a home for returned men. The price is \$25,000, the price the city paid for the Government and is to be paid by the veterans. An expenditure of \$75,000 is contemplated on the building. A campaign for funds, of which the city will be asked to vote \$15,000, is now being arranged. WILL NOT EXTEND.

A surprise was caused here today, when a letter was received at the city hall from the Dominion Steel Products Company that on account of objections by Mayor MacBride against the closing of Leonard street for a large extension of the company's plant, the firm had decided not to go on with the contemplated work. Local aldermen were generally favorable to the company's request, but referred the matter to a committee. In the meantime the application was cancelled by the company. The street in question was not built upon.

ST. THOMAS G.W.V.A. PRESIDENT RESIGNS IN GRATUITY TILT

G. W. Haynes Resigns Office—Disagrees With Members on \$2,000 Plan.

ST. THOMAS, Sept. 12.—Owing to the fact that he could not agree with the demands made by the local branch on the gratuity question, G. W. Haynes, president of the local G. W. V. A., handed in his resignation at the close of this evening's meeting. The members refused to accept the resignation, and he will be urged to reconsider it.

The meeting passed a resolution requesting the Government to appoint a commission to make a thorough investigation into the gratuity question before making any final decision. Should the Government refuse, the resolution is to be forwarded both to Sir Robert Borden and Hon. T. W. Crothers. The meeting was the largest and most enthusiastic on record.

The discussion at time waxed warm. Comrade Taylor's remark that if Sir Arthur Currie was worth \$200,000, then surely the veteran who had fought and bled was worth a couple of thousand, drew forth a round of applause and cheering from the meeting.

President Haynes declared that he was opposed to any demand for \$2,000, and he wanted the public to realize that the demands made in Toronto recently and given publicity in the newspapers did not emanate from the G. W. V. A. as an association, but from a certain set of men. Comrade Kay said that men are coming back today as an association, but they had been in England and having a good time at a soft job on the postoffice staff and drawing between \$2.70 and \$3.00 per day, some even more. Comrade Whitworth drew attention to the excess profits ranging from 10 to 300 per cent. during the war, some of these drawn by heads of the Government.

NO PROSPECT OF AN IMMEDIATE STRIKE BY RAILROAD MEN

Brotherhood Officials Make This Statement at Meeting's Close.

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 12.—There is little prospect of an immediate strike by the six hundred thousand maintenance of way and shop employees represented in the convention here of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railway Shop Laborers. This was the statement of Brotherhood officials at the conclusion of a closed session of the convention this afternoon.

Virtually the entire afternoon, it was stated, was taken up with argument of the wage controversy and, contrary to expectations, the question of a strike was not brought to a vote.

President Wilson will secure for maintenance of way and railway shopmen a standard of wages that will enable them to live in comfort until living costs can be returned to normal very soon, declared Frank S. Morrison, of the American Federation of Labor, before the convention here today.

LAST OF CANADIAN AIRMEN COMING HOME

OTTAWA, Sept. 12.—Approximately a thousand of the personnel of the Royal Air Force will sail for Canada this afternoon. In Canada, this
