**MAYOR CHURCH SAYS WORKING PEOPLE ON VERGE OF REBELLION**

Hearing of Railway Rates Appeal Closed—Premier Meighen Promises "Due Consideration"—Admits Policy "Repugnant To Public Policy" May Have Been Adopted.

Ottawa, Sept. 30.—Hearing by the Government of the appeal from the decision of the railway board granting increased railway rates was closed shortly after 6 o'clock this evening, after two days of argument before the prime minister, Mr. Meighen, and several of his colleagues.

At the close of the argument the prime minister stated that due consideration would be given to the representations made both in support and in defence of the rates judgment. He remarked that many of the matters discussed before the ministers were such as could only be determined by a properly constituted tribunal—such as the railway commission. Unless the Government proposed to reverse the decision of the board it would be necessary for it to confine itself to the question of whether or not a policy had been adopted which is repugnant to public policy. Should it appear that an error had been made by the board, a reference back to that body would be appropriate. However, much matter had been brought forward which could receive the consideration of the Government, and a decision would be given as soon as possible.

**An Array of Counsel**

During the afternoon counsel for the railways, including W. C. Christie for the Grand Trunk system, and F. N. Chrysler for the Canadian Railway Association, closed their arguments. Then counsel representing the appellants were allowed to reply. R. J. Symington, counsel for the Manitoba Government, J. B. Coyne, counsel for the Winnipeg Board of Trade, G. R. Geary, representing the corporation of Toronto, and D'Arcy Scott, counsel for the Saskatchewan Government, being heard. They all emphasized their former arguments and dealt at some length with new matters brought into the case by the representatives of the railways.

The closing argument in support of the appeal was made by Mayor Thomas J. Church of Toronto in his opening sentence declared that the Ontario Government is so busy administering the Ontario temperance act and other matters in which it is concerned that it has no time to attend to the interests of the people. Mr. Church said that he also represented over 300 Ontario municipalities that have decided, because of bad treatment by the steam roads, to have a transportation system in Western Ontario of their own.

Should the new rates be maintained, he said, he would be given to the housing shortage in Toronto, where 15,000 new homes are required. Ontario had been discriminated against in the matter of short haul rates.

Paralyze Industry.  
"The working people of Toronto," said Mr. Church, "are almost in rebellion about these things, and business men say the new rates will paralyze industry and industrial life."

But the people have confidence in the prime minister and believe that he will solve these problems. Action was necessary if the present current of unrest was to be stemmed.

Mr. Church complained that the railway board was unfair in its attitude to the people. He noted that while there were no members of his own present to represent the people, a whole crowd of railway lawyers was in attendance. He asked the Government to allow the appeal and to send the judgment back to the railway board for a proper report.

Morning Session.  
The morning session was taken up

In hearing the argument of William N. Tilley, counsel for the C. P. R., G. F. McDonald, counsel for the Canadian National Railways, who opened the afternoon session, contended that if it was decided that the C. P. R. would pile up unreasonably large surpluses under increased rates the Government had the remedy in its own hands. It could take back by taxation whatever it desired. The rates asked for were fair, he declared, and as applied to some commodities the increases were infinitesimal.

Counsel for the G. T. R. said that had the railway board refused the increase it would have been neglecting its plain duty under the railways act. He contended that there was no great opposition on the part of the public to the rate increases.

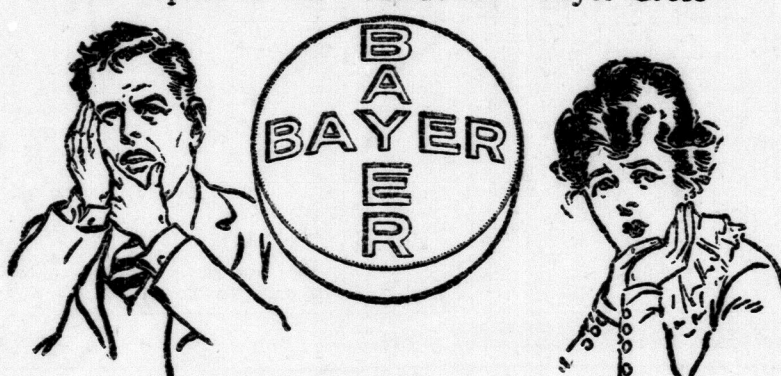
F. H. Chrysler, who appeared for the Canadian Railway Association, said too much attention had been paid to the position of the C. P. R. Twenty-seven other railways in Canada compelled by the railway act to maintain service could not do so unless the new rates were allowed to stand.
