

Should the new rates be maintained, he said, no relief could be given to the housing shortage in Toronto, where 15,000 new homes are required. Ontario had been discriminated against in the matter of short haul rates.

Paralyze industry.

"The working people of Toronto," said Mr. Church, "are almost in rebellion about these things, and business men say the new rates will paralyze industry and industrial life."

But the people have confidence in the prime minister and believe that he will solve these problems. Action was necessary if the present current of unrest was to be stemmed.

Mr. Church complained that the railway board was unfair in its attitude to the people. He noted that while there were no members of Parliament present to represent the people, a whole carload of railway lawyers was in attendance. He asked the Government to allow the appeal and to send the judgment back to the railway board for a proper report.
