MAYOR FOR ENGLAND TO ATTEND ROYAL FUNERAL

His Worship Sails on La Savoie This Morning—Will Join Mayor Guerin.

Mayor Geary will attend the funeral of the late King Edward on May 20. It was decided by the board of control at a private meeting of the board of control yesterday morning. He took the 5.20 p.m. train for New York and if plans do not miscarry, will sail on the Savoie, specially chartered for the purpose, at about 10 a.m. to-day.

The steamer will proceed first to Havre and then to Southampton where his worship will entrain for London. It will go well, he will reach the metropolis on the night before the royal obsequies.

The vessel is being towed into dry-dock. The accident was due to the pilot losing his bearings for a few minutes during a squall and rainfall.

The meat inspectors were held to-night to investigate and demand explanation from the duly appointed slaughterers.

PARIS OBSERVERS Report Length of Tail Doubled in Three Days.

PARIS, May 11.—Astronomers in France are making observations on Halley's comet that are attracting the greatest interest. Maurice Hamy of the Paris Observatory reports that the length of the tail has increased from five to ten degrees in three days. Prof. Deslandres of the University of Paris, in his report to the committee on the comet, says that the hypothesis that the tail is liable to affect the terrestrial atmosphere would not be at all absurd.

Contract Let for "Missing Link."

SHERBROOKE, Que., May 11.—The contract for No. 6 section of the Trent Valley Canal has been let to the Bishop Construction Co. of Montreal and Toronto. This contract takes in the section of about 7 miles from Crowe Bay to Healy Falls, the "missing link" of navigation from Campbellford to Georgian Bay.

Drunk in Charge of Train.

ST. JOHN, N.B., May 11.—Engineer Wm. Johnson and Fireman Roy Campbell of Woodstock, N.B., have been arrested charged with being intoxicated while in charge of a freight locomotive. Their condition was discovered by a brakeman who found that the train was running wild.

OTTAWA, May 11.—It is expected that the appointment of a trade commissioner to New Zealand will be made this week. It is understood that three names have been submitted to the cabinet, one of them being Mr. W. A. Reddoe, an Ottawa newspaper man.
