SPAIN WILL INSIST ON RESPECT FROM GERMANY

MADRID, Spain, via Paris, Sept. 29.—Count Romanones the Spanish premier, upon the reassembling of parliament today, was questioned in the chamber of deputies by Senor Bougues as to whether the government would insist upon respect being shown to international law by the Germans, and whether they would be prevented from torpedoing Spanish ships. The premier replied that it was impossible to speak upon this question at the present moment.

"The government," he added, "has taken into account the importance of this problem, and is studying how it may be solved for the best interests of the country."

Senator Domínguez raised a similar question in the upper house.

Beyond doubt the premier contained the problem demanded immediate solution, as the interests of Spain are being gravely menaced.
