The second section of the Canadian Olympic Team, consisting of seven trapshooters, will sail from Quebec at the end of this week for Antwerp. The main body of Canadian athletes, marathoners, boxers and cyclists, will sail from Montreal on July 24, and will be followed on August 7 by the swimmers and divers who are to compete in the Olympiad. The final detachment, carsmen and wrestlers, will sail on August 13.

It is expected that the Canadian athletes who are to take part in the contests at Antwerp and their attendants will number about 69 of a party, and \$40,000 will be required to finance the undertaking. The central committee has collected half of this sum, and patrictic citizens and sportsmen in all sections of the Dominion are requested by the committee to contribute the \$20,000 yet required. This is the only public appeal being made. Smilar appeals have been made in Great Britain, France and the United States for support of the Olympic teams representing those countries.
