

GOVERNMENT SEES HARD CAMPAIGNING

By-Elections in Colchester and East Elgin to Be Bitterly Fought.

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—(Special).—Some of those who have recently returned from Colchester, N. S. admit that the farmers chose favorable ground on which to give battle to the new government. The constituency is seventy per cent. rural and the agrarian candidate is a popular farmer with a fine overseas military record. It is also headquarters of Nova Scotia United Farmers. Colchester has always been close fighting, and was won by the farmers in the recent provincial test. A victory under such conditions will greatly increase the prestige of the new government, and Hon. F. B. McCurdy and his supporters hope to win by a handsome majority.

In St. John a liberal has yet been secured to oppose the return of Hon. R. W. Wilmour. There have been a half dozen meetings of the opponents of the government without securing anyone willing to make the sacrifice. Hon. William Fugley is the only candidate who could make the contest interesting for Hon. R. W. Wilmour but he is too shrewd a politician to lead a forlorn hope. If an opposition candidate is secured he will be defeated by thousands.

East Elgin Outlook.

Government prospects in East Elgin grow steadily brighter. Here again the battleground is all favorable to the farmers with the rural vote three times the urban. The government has several candidates and the brighter prospects are seen in the contest among candidates to carry the government banner.

MILLING INDUSTRY GRAVELY MENACED

Stock-Raising Is Also Jeopardized, Says Big Deputation at Ottawa.

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—(Special).—Owing to differential ocean rates on wheat and flour, two great industries, milling and stock-raising, are seriously imperiled, according to a deputation of millers, steamship men, members of the United Farmers and representatives from the Ontario department of agriculture, that waited on the government today. The vast spread between ocean rates on wheat and flour threatens ruin to our export flour trade, it was contended. Foreign countries can buy our wheat, carry it home and mill it cheaper than our millers can mill our wheat here and pay the excessive ocean rates on flour to foreign markets. If our flour mills are restricted to the demand of the home market, the supply of bran and shorts will be entirely inadequate to maintain the stock-raising industry at present.

The various groups in the deputation had different remedies. Some proposed that the government merchant marine carry flour at a rate which would permit of successful competition in foreign markets. To this the representatives of the steamship companies objected as being unfair competition. Others favored a subsidy on flour for export sufficient to overcome the differential in ocean rates on wheat and flour. The cabinet told the deputation they recognized the outlook was serious and that it was remedied they wanted and suggested a joint memorandum, agreeing on a solution of this problem.

Millers' Woes.

In a memorandum presented by the Millers' Association, W. A. Black said that in a conference with agents of steamships on August 4 an offer had been made to reduce the differential by 15 cents on one hundred pounds, but this was absolutely refused, and his mills would be reduced to half capacity. He further stated that he had an inquiry for 700,000 barrels of flour from South Africa and the best rate he could get was \$2.76 from the Elder- Dempster Line. The Natal government contracted with the same line for \$1.18 per barrel, or \$1.58 less than they asked him.

After dealing with the value and necessity of wheat to the stock industry, the millers' memorandum submits that "the government ships, instead of being part of the combine known as the North Atlantic conference, should be used solely in the best interest of Canada, and this could best be accomplished by carrying flour for export at the same freight rate as wheat and the best rate he could get was \$2.76 from the Elder- Dempster Line. The Natal government contracted with the same line for \$1.18 per barrel, or \$1.58 less than they asked him.

Miners' Ballots Favor a Strike

Older Men Are Reluctant, But Boys Are Polling a Heavy Vote.

London, Aug. 28.—The threatened strike of coal miners continues to engross the attention of the newspapers and the public. The balloting in the South Wales on the question of whether the men shall strike has virtually concluded. The result of the balloting as announced early today, is as follows:

In favor of striking, 148,471; against striking, 42,013. This gives considerably more than a two-thirds majority in the South Wales district in favor of the men ceasing work.

Report Set-Back for J. O. Spracklin

Sandwich Inspector Arrests Town Councillor, Who is Later Released.

Windsor, Aug. 27.—Ignorance of the provisions of the law under which they are operating resulted in a sharp setback for Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin, Sandwich Methodist preacher, and S. M. Hallam, town government license inspectors, today, when they brought Wm. Turner of Amherstburg, a member of the town council, and Grant Duff, Hydro-Electric street railway agent at Amherstburg, into police court for an alleged violation of the O.T.A. The inspectors announced that the accused had been placed in charge of a number of cases of liquor in a freight car, and that some time later the liquor was found to be missing. Conclusion was alleged.

RENT PROFITEERS IN LINE FOR PROBE

Whyte, chief commissioner of the Canadian board of commerce, has recommended to Ottawa that the board be given authority to investigate the enforcement of the new rent law. Chairman Whyte found that much feeling exists in this question, but with its present powers the board has no authority to conduct an official enquiry.

Government to Spend Millions at Vancouver

Vancouver, Aug. 27.—It is the intention of the Dominion government, if given proper authority by the citizens of Vancouver, to expend millions of dollars in making the port one of the best in the world. Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine, said today to a delegation from the board of trade.

Canada's Exports Balance Imports

Heavily Adverse Trade Balance With U.S. Alone, However, for Year.

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—For the twelve months ending July 30, Canada's exports and imports were about equal with imports of \$1,253,191,785, and exports of \$1,264,463,527. The total duty collected for this year was \$208,001,175. The total trade for this period was \$2,517,655,312, compared with former corresponding annual period of a total trade of \$2,244,238,963. There was imported from the United Kingdom \$191,982,054, and exported to that country \$409,481,559.

Poland's Terms Unchanged

London, Aug. 27.—Premier Witos has notified the Russian soviet government by wireless that the Polish victory has produced no change in the intentions of the government of Poland, says a Warsaw despatch to The London Times. The premier added that instructions to the Polish peace delegation at Minsk have not been changed, and that the Poles desire only an honorable peace.

Hamilton

Hamilton, Aug. 27.—In a circular letter to the board of control today, W. H. Davis, city treasurer, issues a warning that the unsettled state of the money market forbids any big expenditure that is not absolutely necessary. Following the receipt of the communication, Controller Jutten declared that at the next meeting he would move for the reconsideration of all wrongs authorized by the rate-payers.

Report Greatest Crop in Frontenac's History

Kingston, Ont., Aug. 27.—(Special).—The greatest crop in the history of Frontenac county is being harvested, and it is stated that, owing to the crop being so heavy and the trouble undergone in securing experienced men for the threshers, the work of threshing will be continued until very late in the fall. Owing to the high cost of coal the threshers have increased their rate from four to five cents per bushel.
