Gymnasium Classes for January—Junior boys, 9 classes, attendance of 334, average 37; senior boys, 9 classes, attendance of 308, average 30; intermediate boys, 8 classes, attendance of 203, average 25; business men, 12, average 16; seniors 12 classes, attendance of 472, average 39; total, 30 classes and attendance of 1654, with an average of 47.

Last month there were 39 classes with an attendance of 780 and an average of 40. The average per class day January, 24 days was 69; average per class day December 21 days was 58.

During the month games and contests have started that will continue three months, taking up different gymnastic and athletic events and the total number of applications to date being 546.

A PRIZE FOR AN ATHLETE

A. W. Covey Honored at the Every Day Club Last Evening—Large Crowd Cheers the Speakers

One evening last spring, A. Turner B. Howard visited the Every Day Club grounds and found a group of men who were interested in the club and its work on the running track. He called the president and asked him to give him a position in the club. The president, who was a member of the club, made the most points in the summer's sport a hat-trick which he would make himself in his spare time. The offer was gladly accepted, and at the club room last night Mr. Howard presented A. W. Covey with the trophy, which is made of wood with inlaid silver and with six curved and polished horns as hat-holders.

The room was filled with men, who turned from the games and reading tables to hear Mr. Howard and the general programme, which lasted all ten o'clock.

Mr. Howard said he had been observing the work of the club, and saw what it was doing and seeking to do for the common man. Naming half a dozen or more of those who had stood by the club from its beginning, and were still in evidence nearly every night at the room, he praised them very highly for their unselfish devotion, and dwelt upon the need of a society where men could find sympathy with the man who is down. Turning to Mr. Covey, he made a neat presentation speech, to which Mr. Howard and the club members responded.

After Mr. Howard's remarks there were for Mr. Covey and for Mr. Howard.

Mr. Covey, in his reply, said that he had about decided to quit the running track when he came to St. John, but he had caught the fever again on the club's grounds, had joined the club and done his best to uphold its honor.

He could say that the club had done much for clean sport. Every man, no matter where he came from got fair play in a contest, and they only desired that the best man win. In this respect the Every Day Club set an example to other clubs in the province. It had the best track in the province, with the exception of the Wanderers at Halifax.
