## SECRET ACT RAIDS SUSSEX ON TUESDAY

Consignment of "Glassware" Seized on Christmas Eve and the Result Was Dry Christmas for Kings County Town.

Sussex, Dec. 25.—Following somewhat lively raids on three liquor sellers on Dec. 24, Sussex passed about the driest Christmas in its experience. The raiders found a stock of wet goods so large as to indicate that the saloon men had made great preparations to dispense Christmas cheer of the bottled variety, but when Christmas eve arrived the barrels, kegs and bottles were locked up in Medley Memorial hall under guard of several stalwart constables. Many thought the seizures made yesterday would be followed by a lax of the crusade, but it was not so. Christmas was not only dry, but it was enlivened by an extended search for liquor conducted by the inspector and several constables. They visited Lorenzo Bardon, J. McArthur, the Royal Hotel, John Morrison and Frank Myers. McArthur, Morrison and Frank Myers were suspected of storing the stuff, not of selling it. No liquor was discovered in any of these cases.

This morning an incident occurred that may cause a legal tale. Five cases of stuff marked "glassware" arrived by train and was taken to Doherty's place. The man there would not accept delivery, and as the team was leaving Inspector Cusack and his men seized the goods and removed them from the express train. Some are questioning their legal right to do this, but that point will soon be cleared up. The cases to come up before Magistrate Hornbrook this morning are: Sylvester Madden, on two charges; George Doherty, Daniel Ross, and Harry Wilson, the latter of Hampton. There is evidently a lively time ahead if further attempts are made to sell liquor, for the crusaders declare that they are going to keep the town dry at any cost.

The raids aroused unusual public interest, and while one was in progress yesterday afternoon the street was thronged by hundreds of people who shouted and applauded as the liquor was removed. The Doherty raid. The women in the crowd, of whom there were many, were especially demonstrative.

## BETTER OUTLOOK IN THE STATES

It Is Believed Conditions Will Improve After the New Year Opens.

(Montreal Witness)

In the United States the commercial situation shows slow, but sure improvement. There may be some further weeding out of unsound or useless concerns before the turn of the New Year, and if so it will not be regrettable, as their existence is a constant source of perplexity. Funds withdrawn for crop moving purposes will soon begin to return from the interior, while money withdrawn by interior banks during the recent panic on Wall Street will also soon come back with considerable freedom. The distribution of investment demand for stocks and bonds will be helpful, as they will stimulate many individuals as well as business concerns and industrial companies to lessen the indebtedness contracted during the past few months. In many respects the situation across the border is better than it was a year ago because the worst is known and the future is chiefly a matter of recognition of and an adjustment to changed conditions.

Financiers generally, as well as brokers, are confident that the Bank of England will be reduced early in January. This in itself would have a marked effect on the New York market. The latter has held its own during the week with a most satisfactory recovery in the majority of the leading stocks and bond issues. The opinion seems to prevail that by the second week in January, New York stocks will be selling much in advance of the present quotations. For the past few months, the "bears" have had much their own way on Wall Street and their activities have certainly not been in the interest of the country at large. However, the more cautious and conservative members of the New York Stock Exchange believe that the worst is over, and they base their argument on the fact that the importation of gold into the United States is about over, and that their own technical position has much improved since the first of the month. That has been shown each recent week by the splendid statements issued by the directors of the Bank of England in lowering the rate of interest at the earliest possible date.
