

7. Students may reside out of College, though the resident system is preferred.

8. Last, but by no means least, there is attached to the College, and a feeder to it, a Collegiate School, which is now in first-class order. Its staff consists of three resident and three non-resident masters. The resident masters are all graduates of Cambridge or Oxford, the Head Master being a Wrangler of the former University. This School is rapidly growing in public favour. The buildings and grounds have been recently improved, and everything is provided which is needed by a school of high intellectual standard: while the fees for board and tuition are very reasonable. The New Calendar has just been issued and can be obtained from Dr. H. Y. Hind or Rev. Dr. Bowman, Windsor, N. S. All these are reasons why the College should be supported by Churchmen.

A new professorship has been suggested, to be called the "Churchmen's Professorship"—of which the salary is to be raised by subscriptions of not less than one dollar. Every Churchman and Churchwoman therefore, however small their means can thus help to encourage and sustain their College, and the Province will during the year be thoroughly canvassed for these subscriptions.

The buildings and endowments are worth together nearly \$200,000; the income being between \$9000. and \$10,000. At the present about \$5000. a year more is needed, which could easily be raised if the people would do it. And it is now the ardent hope of the Governors and Alumni that good reasons are shewn to the Church for advancing and improving their own Institutions, which justify their existence by their success.

The Church School for Girls.

Every Church person is earnestly urged to procure and circulate the last Calendar of the Church School for Girls, which is in a highly successful condition. The Church is thus fully equipped for her educational work, and will make her mark upon the rising generation. The Church people of the Maritime Provinces should feel proud of their College and Schools, and seek to spread their influence as widely as possible.
