Swimming Tank, Showers, and Reading Rooms To Be Open During Summer

The bowling alleys of the Y. M. C. I. in Cliff street will close for the season this evening. There is yet enough time for the three men league to be rolled and when this is done the alleys will be formally closed. The game will be bowled tonight. The gymnasium activities have also been suspended for the summer months and there will be no more class work until the fall.

IMPORTANT WORK BY CITY WATER DEPARTMENT

The water and sewerage department is now engaged in an important work of renewal. This is the laying of an eight-inch main from Mill street down North street to Drury Lane, along the lane to Union and up Union to Mill and Dock. This replaces an old four inch main which has corroded to a two-inch capacity and which has been depended upon for the protection of some of the largest buildings in the city.

Another important project to be made this season will be the laying of a twelve-inch main in Prince William street, from the three lamps to Princess street, to replace a six-inch main laid more than sixty years ago. This will be undertaken soon.

AMATEUR FARMERS ARE INDUSTRIOUSLY AT WORK

That the citizens who procured lots of land on the city property on the Manawash road are taking an interest in the increased production campaign, is manifest from the work already accomplished and the desire of others to make up for lost time and get their crops in. Must Drop Rank If Unqualified

New Order Affects 3,000 Lieutenants of Active Militia Units—Not Many in St. John in This Class

An order received from the adjutant general at Ottawa announces that steps are to be taken at once to have all the unqualified lieutenants in the active militia of Canada resign their commissions. The order does not affect the higher ranks, nor lieutenants who are attending schools of instruction to qualify for their commissions.

This action, it is said, was forced on the militia department by the action of the militia units. Nearly every unit in the Canadian militia has at present, so says the statement, and has had for some time, many times the authorized number of lieutenants on its strength. It has been estimated that the whole of the dominion that there are no less than 3,000 unqualified lieutenants on the strength of the different militia units. Many of these men have not taken any measures to qualify for their commissions, aside from "swanking" about in their uniforms and using as an excuse for not enlisting that they were waiting for an appointment to an overseas unit.

The order indirectly affects the overseas units, as, to get a commission in one of the overseas units, a man must first be attached to one of the militia units. This precaution has been taken to eliminate the possibility of spies or other undesirable getting commissions. It is thought probable that this order will be followed by one affecting the higher ranks.

The order does not affect very many officers in St. John. Almost every officer on the rolls of the local regiments at the time war was declared volunteered for overseas service. Of those since gazetted, the great majority also have joined overseas units. In most cases the officers have qualified promptly.

LETTER FROM MISS WARNER

The following letter has come from Miss Agnes Warner:

Ambulance Volant, Chirurgical Mobile No. 1, Secteur Postal No. 21, France, May 14, 1917.

Dear

How can I thank the friends and readers of "My Beloved Pollus" enough for all that they have done for me and my soldiers, and Mr. Cody for the very nice preface—never in my wildest dreams would I have imagined that one outside of the family would have been interested in my letters, and I can scarcely believe it is true that they have been the means of bringing in so much money. You have all been so good and kind about them and they have helped my Pollus so much. The state of mind and nerve at the end of a hard day is not conducive to good letter writing.

I am sending you the model of a tank, the German aeroplane that has done so much bombing. They are small and very swift and carry four, six or eight bombs. We see them very often and the bombs drop too close to be pleasant sometimes. Yesterday a piece of shell went through the roof of one of our barracks but fortunately nobody was hurt.

I regret to say the sleeping bag sent last October has not yet reached me, it has been traced to the Services des Dons Indulgences in France and I am in hopes it will turn up in time for next winter when it will be most useful if we are still here, but everything is going so well that we hope the war will be over before the end of the year. I do not see how it can last much longer.

The larrigans, as I wrote you, arrived in time for Christmas, and for the first time my feet were warm and dry in the terrible cold, wet, muddy weather we were having. Please thank many times all who were interested in sending me a lovely present, and one that would contribute so much to my comfort. I would like to write to each one and may be able to do so, but do not have very many spare minutes. Over one thousand cases passed through this ambulance the first month we were here and before we were fully organized. Some stayed only twenty-four hours, but the badly wounded and the worst gas cases were kept. It was a great joy to have so many of them recover; when they first came in there did not seem to be much hope for any of them. We have sixteen nurses now, all well trained and such splendid women it is a pleasure to work with them.

MEANS SAVING FOR CITY

Substitute for Lead as Filler at Joints of Water Mains

Thorough tests of a patented substitute for lead as a filler for the joints in water mains have been made by the water and sewerage department, with the result that a large quantity has been ordered. It is estimated that the use of the material will result in a very large saving in the course of a year. The cost of the substitute is only slightly less than that of lead but only about one-fifth of the quantity is used. In addition, it requires no caulking and thus avoids this extra expense for labor. When lead is used it is necessary to make the excavation large enough to permit the workmen to work around the joints with their hammers and especially in rock cuttings, this frequently is a matter of considerable expense. On a test job the connection was made with the new material at a cost of thirty cents, as compared with a cost of \$2.97 for the same job when lead was used. On such large jobs as the Lancaster renewal, the saving will be well worth while.
