Great Shot Wins Golf Championship

Southern Girl Defeats National Golf Champion 3 up and 1 to Play

Philadelphia, Sept. 25.—A phenomenal iron shot at just the moment when it was of the utmost importance won the Berthelby cup for Miss Alexa Stirling.

Miss Stirling won by 3 up and 1 to play, and she thoroughly deserved her victory. She played seven of the last nine holes to perfection.

It is doubtful whether any woman ever put up such a consistent game over the very difficult Huntington Valley course. Luck favored Mrs. Vanderbeck for the first ten holes, the national title-holder having a lead of 3 up going to eleven.

It was at the fourteenth hole that Miss Stirling made the remarkable iron shot which won her the cup. The ball was nearly 200 yards away, and Mrs. Vanderbeck had made a fine drive and was reasonably sure of a 4. It was a genuine "crucial moment".

It was up to Miss Stirling to attempt the miraculous. Selecting her heaviest midiron, she carefully calculated the angles, then, putting all the strength of her shoulders into the stroke, she whaled away at the ball, caught it cleanly, whipped it through that narrow opening, and sent it whizzing straight and true, a full 175 yards, carrying to the edge of the distant green.

It was a wonderful shot. Mrs. Vanderbeck gazed at the flying ball, watched it land nicely on the green, then slightly topped her own second and was a bit short of the green. She overran the hole on her third, missed her fourth, a difficult downhill putt and lost the hole when Miss Stirling laid her third dead and was down in a par 4 and 1 up for the first time in the match. That one shot really settled the contest, for the fair outsider, inspired

AVIATOR FALLS 3000 FEET AND SURVIVES

London, Sept. 26.—A young Liverpool member of the Royal Flying Corps, who is now in training somewhere in a remote part of London, fell from a height of 3,000 feet in a hot air balloon on Tuesday.
