New Brunswick Figures Announced By Federal Inspector McLeod

TOTAL FOR MONTH

Increase in Prosecutions of Delinquents This Year Is Reported

A decrease of \$93,155.46 in federal income tax returns in New Brunswick for April of this year, as compared with the return for the same month in 1925, was reported this morning at the office of Norman P. MacLeod, federal inspector of taxation. Returns for last April amounted to \$370,167.18, while the taxes for the corresponding month of 1925 to-
