

SUGGESTS VISIT TO THIS PROVINCE

Visitor Says Different Parts of Canada Should be Better Acquainted.

That the immigration of 150,000 farmers with their families to Canada and their settling on the ready-made farms of the prairie provinces, would solve the problem of all of Canada was the firm conviction of Robert Henderson, inspector of branches of the Canada Permanent Mortgage Corporation who is at present in the city.

The immigration of these people, numbering in the aggregate 600,000, would solve the problems of the western provinces because their arrival would kill for ever the wanderlust of some of the farmers of the west which is forever stirring in their hearts.

Mr. Henderson declared that there were 150,000 ready-made farms, only waiting for occupants who could put in a crop and who would reap their first harvest next fall. After these farms were taken up there would be plenty of time to begin homesteading. Railways were recognizing this now and instead of advertising the farms which were ready for the farmer to take up.

Send Speakers West.

In his opinion, the Maritime Provinces could do nothing better than to send some of their best orators to Toronto and address the Canadian Club, the Board of Trade and kindred organizations. They should not discuss politics but the problems and the solution.

He thought that these provinces should unite for the purpose of advertising what they have and felt convinced that such a programme would bring results.

Ontario people did not know New Brunswick nor did the people here know and understand Ontario. He thought that if the Board of Trade here would invite a delegation from the Toronto Board of Trade, which numbered 2,600 members, to tour these provinces, banquet them, discuss the problems of the Maritimes with them and hear their story, it would create that feeling which was so necessary for the advancement of Canada.

Ontario this year had the highest valued crop of its existence. In New Brunswick it was valued through the records of his office that the farmers were doing well.

Mr. Henderson will spend several days next week touring this province.

HEAR OWN SOLDIERS MURDERED GENERAL

London, Sept. 30.—General Wang Hual Ching, one of Wu Pei Fu's divisional commanders, has been murdered near Jehol by his own men, the Daily Mail's Mukden correspondent hears.

Wang was bribed to desert Chang two years ago, when he joined Wu with an entire division. If he has been murdered, a split in the Chihli (Peking government) party is likely, as it has been variously reported that many of Wang's generals had sympathies with Chang Tso Lin.

WOMAN PARACHUTE JUMPER IS KILLED

Auch, France, Oct. 1.—Mme. Lilliane Darcy, a parachute jumper, was killed while giving an exhibition here recently. The jump was the feature of a fête arranged in honor of Captain Georges Pelletier d'Olay, who recently completed a Paris-to-Tokyo flight in 45 days.

Mme. Darcy went up in a plane with one of France's noted aviators, M. Provant. When the machine had reached a good height over the Ardennes she jumped, but the parachute failed to open until she was a few feet from the ground. She received terrible injuries from which she died in a few minutes.

Sussex, Oct. 1.—The Kings county fair got away tonight to a good start. A torchlight parade headed by the Citizens' Band, marched from the armories to the exhibition building and the doors were thrown open to the public at 7 o'clock. The official opening address was made by Ralph St. John Free, president of the S. A. A. C.

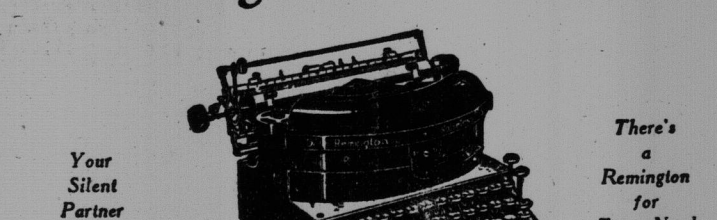

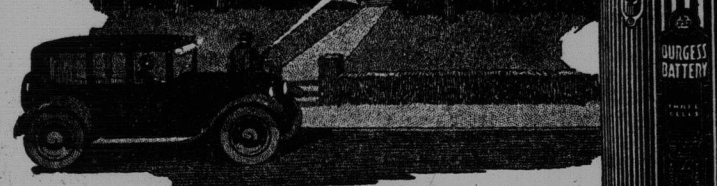

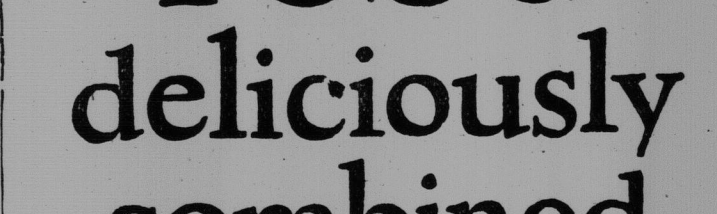

MILL INSURANCE

The ruins of the saw mill at Ketepes was still burning yesterday. The structure with contents owned by J. A. Gregory were totally destroyed by fire Tuesday night. The insurance, amounting to \$15,000, was placed as follows: Guardian, \$5,000; Palatine, \$5,000; Eastern Underwriters, \$5,000; North Empire, \$1,000; Columbia, \$1,000. The insurance was placed through Charles H. Belyea, Jr., Princess street, a general insurance agent. The lumber which was stored at the rear of the mill was saved. While about 35 men have been thrown out of employment, it is estimated that Mr. Gregory's loss will be in the vicinity of between \$25,000 and \$30,000.
