SAYS MEN ARE CAUSE OF IMMODEST DRESS

Boston Speaker Blames Present
Day Parents For Youthful
Wrongdoing.

New York, Nov. 15.—Miss Margaret Slattery, speaking on "What is the Matter with the Rising Generation?" at the Old South forum, laid the blame for the sins of the American youth on the present generation of parents. When the older generation turns about and reforms, she said, the young men and women will follow. Speaking of the immodest dress worn by some women, she declared that men were the cause of such conditions.

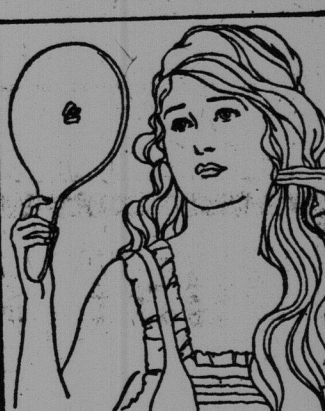
"She is queer today in the things she wears, this young modern girl," said Miss Slattery. "Who designs these ridiculous clothes and puts them on the market for women to buy? It's the men. They make them, have young girl models wear them and then women purchase and wear them. Then the men criticize these designs. The only way to stop these ridiculous styles is for the women to stop buying them." Regarding motion pictures, she said that she looked forward to the day when producers will offer clean pictures, with themes of idealism in love, and presenting the sex problems in a way that will not shock patrons. Asking her audience why chambers of commerce and women's clubs permit young girls to think there is more honor and fame in parading in bathing suits on the board walk at Atlantic City than in being clean-minded high school students, she was answered by a man, who cried, "because they're yellow."

She blamed the modern newspapers for causing a large percentage of the good and evil of today, saying that they are the pivot upon which the greater amount of good influence can turn. Pleading for idealism, which she said was sadly lacking in the people of today, she asked: "Where can you get that deep stir that made Patrick Henry and Abraham Lincoln?"

Condemning the rising tide of divorce and the scandals and contempt for law shown by the older generation, she asserted that it was time the divorce wave should be halted.
