





GIRL FIGHTS BLAZE, SAVES BURNING MAN

New York Stenographer Goes
to Aid of Clerk Caught in
Flames After Explosion.

New York, June 18.—Two men were
burned and several firemen cut by fall-
ing glass during a two-alarm fire which
swept the five-story brick building at
297 Pearl street. The building was oc-
cupied by Theal, Stear & Co., dealers
in essential oils. The fire tied up traf-
fic for an hour, and the damage was esti-
mated at \$25,000.
The fire started on the third floor, fol-
lowing an explosion, shortly after five
o'clock, just at the peak of the rush
hour. Most of the score of employees had
left when the explosion occurred from
some unknown cause.
