would never let the big policeman or any

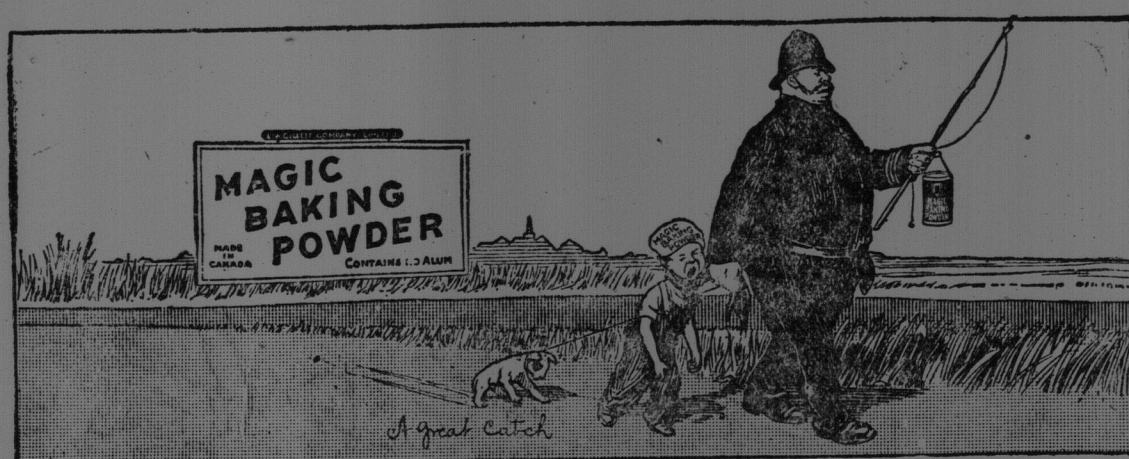
of the rest of his questioners have his

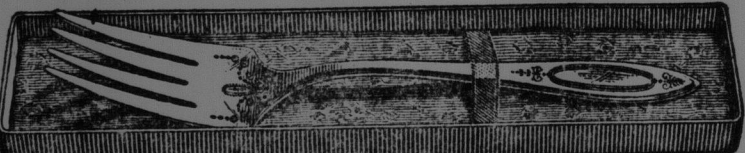

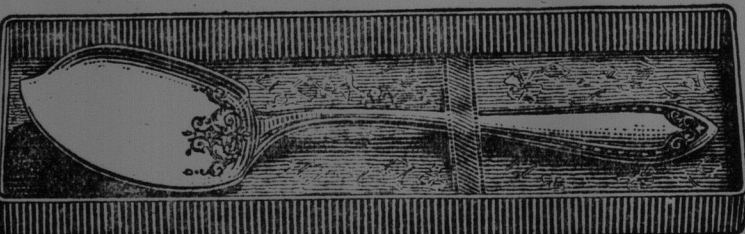

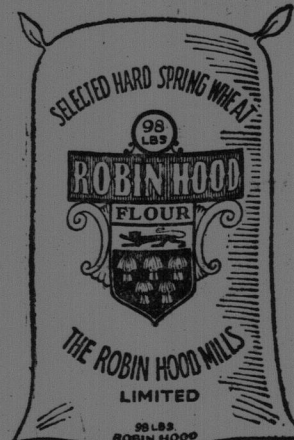
