Ottawa, Ont., March 12.—Proposed amendments to the election law are being drafted. One amendment will be to allow a ballot box near depots or in the vicinity of the polling place, and another providing for the use of a ballot box in the home of a voter who is away from home on polling day.

ILLINOIS WOMEN VOTE IN FIRST ELECTION Springfield, Ill., March 11.—Women in hundred of villages and small cities throughout the state on Tuesday participated for the first time in the election of nominees for principal officers in local primaries. In many of the towns no petitions had been filed and blank ballots bearing only the party designation greeted the newly enfranchised voters on their arrival at the polling places. In more than a hundred municipalities the local option question is to be voted on at the regular village election April 2, and in these places there was noticeable activity among the women who are expected to be a deciding element in the wet or dry contest.

MANY MILLIONS MORE FOR THE RUSSIAN ARMY St. Petersburg, March 12.—The extraordinary military estimates just submitted to the Russian Duma, amount to more than \$60,000,000, showing an increase of thirty per cent, as compared with the extraordinary army estimates of 1913.

Protect Italian Emigrants Rome, March 12.—The emigration bureau has issued a decree providing that steamship companies selling tickets to would-be emigrants must reimburse such persons for their expenses from their native homes to the port of embarkation and return when they are refused permission to board vessels owing to the restrictions imposed by the American laws.
