(Toronto Mail and Empire). That the Canadian troops now assembled at Valcartier will add to the laurels of their country no Canadian doubts, and several American newspapers that have commented on the matter expect Canadians to particularly distinguish themselves.

At Paardeburg The Canadians got into action first in December, 1899, when a detachment of 100 and a detachment of Australians and some English troops made a dash for the Boer line.

After several days of fighting the Canadians and the Gordons had entrenched themselves within 700 yards of the Boer lines, the most advanced position of the army, and one pitch dark night a general attack was ordered.
