paid the utmost price, remember that they too—those happy, cherry lips cut down on the very threshold of life—would wish it so.

Such is the message which constitutes the only editorial in the Christmas number of The Listening Post, that famous chronicle of the battalion of the division. Read it well, Canada, for the heart of not only a regiment but a nation's army is in it.

And here is another message from the brigadier of this famous brigade who writes "from every member of the brigade to anxious hearts at home, to assure them they have our constant love and devotion, our daily thoughts, and our wishes for a Merry and Happy Christmas. ARE THEY PREPARING A RETREAT?  
Reports from Belgium are to the effect that the Germans, not satisfied with the heavy taxes laid on the inhabitants of that unhappy country and regular collection under pretense of meeting the natural expenses of any administration, are now systematically completing the process of removing to Germany portable property of every kind. The avowed purpose of the robbers is the utter ruin of Belgium in order that for many a years after the war they may not be industrial competitors of their present masters.

ESTIMATES GERMAN'S  
HAVE 3,000,000 FIGHTING  
MEN ON ALL FRONTS  
The New York World's Paris correspondent cables:  
German combatant forces on all fronts are estimated at 3,150,000 by the military office of 127th St. Paris. He estimates the present total strength of the German army is 5,000,000. Non-combatant units, which he says total 2,870,000 men, are needed by Germany for guarding the frontier, occupying invaded territories and maintaining the long lines of communication.

There are now exactly 154 divisions on the Anglo-French front," he writes. "Each division has only three regiments of infantry, to each of which there are only two or three battalions. These divisions count only upon a maximum effective of 850 combatants. Thus for the infantry there are only a maximum of 4,850 rifles to a division. If special troops, artillery, engineers, general staffs and other services are added a German division possesses scarcely 12,000 men all told.

The general total combatant forces on the western front, including army corps and army organizations, amount to about 2,900,000 men, a figure considerably lower than that of the Franco-British armies. The 115 divisions, of which 77 are German, opposed to the Russians and Romanians on the eastern front have been reduced thus far only to 118, but each division has been greatly diminished by withdrawals of individual units. The Austrians have weakened their divisions in the same manner. Without counting recent levies made of the 77 German divisions, there remain on the eastern front 1,000,000 Germans.

"To Italy, Germany has sent in support of 45 Austrian divisions only seven divisions of about 100,000 men each. On the Italian front, held chiefly by the Bulgars with 244 battalions, the Germans have only 80,000 fighting men, but certain indications point to reinforcements having been sent thither recently from the Russian front.  
An estimate of Austria-Hungary's army strength, given in an Associated Press despatch from French army headquarters, places it at 1,200,000. The total war strength of the Dual Empire before the war was 8,600,000.  
The strength of the Austro-German forces in Italy, according to official despatches from Rome to Washington, is 840,000 men.
