

## TO IRISH M. P.'S

Had Been Cleaning Home Rule Aid in Australia

## REPORT FINE RECEPTION

A Letter From William Redmond

—Wm. O'Brien Criticizes Lloyd George—Speeches by Walter Long, Sir John Simon and Duke of Bedford

(Times' Special Correspondence)

Dublin, Nov. 28.—A large and representative assembly of London Irishmen met at the Holborn Restaurant last Saturday night to welcome W. A. Redmond, M.P., and R. Hazleton, M.P., who with J. T. Donohue, of Belfast, toured the Australian colonies on behalf of the Irish party for the purpose of collecting funds for the furtherance of the home rule cause. A complimentary dinner was given to the delegates by the Irish Parliament Branch of the United Irish League of Great Britain. John O'Connor, M.P., presided, and John Redmond, the Nationalist leader, was present.

W. A. Redmond, M.P., responding to the toast of "Our Guests," said the outstanding feature of their tour was the marvelous unanimity and universality of their reception. Everywhere they went they were received by the mayors of Australian cities and representative public men, accompanied them on the platform. There was scarcely a word of opposition from one end of Australia to the other. If a plebiscite of the empire was taken on the question of home rule, and he challenged the Unionists to take it, then it would be found that Australia and New Zealand, and no doubt Canada, also would plump in favor of restoring to Ireland her national rights.

R. Hazleton, M.P., who said that he had seen a great deal of Irishmen in North and South America, as well as in Australia, observed that the Irishman prospered abroad because he was in an atmosphere of liberty, freedom and equality. That atmosphere was what they were seeking to restore in Ireland, and their Irish and kin were helping them to do so.

A speech by William O'Brien, M.P., at Cork, the other night, contained a lively denunciation of Mr. Lloyd George as the evil genius of his own party and of Ireland. When the speaker was asked the home rule bill would be discussed, he said, Mr. Lloyd George rushed in to club him like a baton man at a Molly Maguire convention. He not only refused the slightest concession, but refused with insult and outrage and with the weapon of a cad.

Mr. Lloyd George could not forgive the "All-Ireland" members for turning out to be right in their opposition to his budget and to his insurance bill, and, above all, could not forgive them for their land purchase amendment, which brought him a humiliating defeat in the cabinet and of ruin. He (the speaker) was afraid the bill would come to nothing but disappointment and smoke. The prophecy that it would be passed without another general election was grotesque.

Unionist M. P.

Speaking in the Palace Theatre, Walter Long said that the climax in the career of the government was reached when all the attacks on the government culminated in a fair hand-to-hand fight. No government was compelled, or ought to be compelled, he said, to resign because they were beaten in a division. Any government was entitled to review its position, but he ventured to say that never in the history of parliament would they find any government which had acted as this government had done at the present moment.

Their answer, continued Mr. Long, would be that the Unionists were beaten in 1905. It was true that the Unionists were beaten on an estimate for which he himself was responsible. They did not resign, and he was willing, if the government would agree, to make them a present of the Unionist precedent in full. The Unionists were beaten in July. They did not resign, but they did resign in the following November. He did not press the government to resign now. Let them take the three months the Unionist took and resign then. tohuco? They had heard of a lump strike; was there to be a drink strike? If that was to be the consequence of carrying home rule, temperance reformers would have no reason to complain.

The Duke of Bedford, addressing 5,000 Unionists at Luton, said that the House of Lords could not in any way alter the home rule bill. They only could delay for eight months. Belief in the polls of delay was born of the rain hope the something might turn up in the interval to destroy the bill. He did not regard a policy of waiting helplessly for something to turn up as statesmanship. It was rotten policy.

The prime minister had no doubt that the government were going to make of home rule bill an act of parliament, that the crisis could not be avoided. What it was to be in September, 1913, or six months after, in May, 1914? He was sorry to see the Unionist party claiming that "something, we know not what, is sure to turn up if we wait eight months of delay." How could a party rally with devotion to that bait?

"Something may turn up in eight months." If the Unionists could raise a better cry than that they in liquid except water, and abstain from all action at all.
