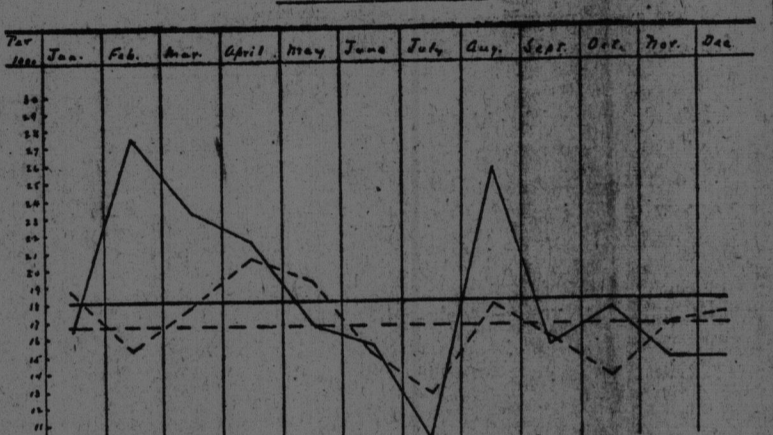

Doctor Carrell Gives First Great Scientific News to World in 1913—Uses Extract From Thyroid Gland and Macerated Parts of Other Organs of Body

(Canadian Press) New York, Jan. 3.—Dr. Alexis Carrell of the Rockefeller Institute who received the Nobel prize for medicine in 1912 is the first to announce a great scientific discovery in the current issue of the Journal of Experimental Medicine.
