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## WHAT WOMEN CAN DO

The Times prints today an article telling what some of the women of Dublin have done for the good of the children in the more congested portions of the city. Canadians will be interested to know that Lady Aberdeen gave to the movement the weight of her influence and support. We are told that the waste spots and even unwholesome dumps have been converted into lawns and garden spots where the little children may play or find healthful occupation and enjoyment. If every city a larger number of women would interest themselves in work of this kind the worst slum districts would gradually disappear, and in every district there would be more evidences of a taste for the beautiful; while conditions under which the people live would be more healthful. The Times commends to the ladies of St. John the article in this issue relating to the garden playgrounds of Dublin. They may find in the story an inspiration which will lead them to take a greater interest in the general appearance and the general health of St. John. There are almost no opportunities in the city proper for lawns and gardens, but there are at least opportunities to make more healthful and attractive those portions of the city which are most congested and most in need of improved conditions.

## THE WHITE PLAGUE

An intelligent and vigorous crusade against the white plague is being carried on in eastern Nova Scotia and Cape Breton. Some time ago a book specially prepared on the subject of Consumption, its Cause, Prevention and Cure, was distributed throughout the counties of Antigonish, Guysboro and Pictou. A new edition of this book has now been issued for the island of Cape Breton, and a copy will be placed in every dwelling-house, while a number of extra copies will be placed in each school. At the last meeting of the town council of North Sydney the question of erecting a sanatorium for consumptives was discussed by leading physicians, and the council adopted a resolution in favor of such action.

We are reminded that in St. John, which has waited many months for a decision concerning the site of a sanatorium for advanced cases of tuberculosis, there is still no decision, and there are still probably a hundred homes in the city which are dangerous sources of infection. It is announced that the committee to which the question of a site was referred is now deliberating upon the question, and there should not be any further delay.

## HELPING THE CHILDREN

Perhaps no other man in Canada is so familiar with the darker side of life as Mr. J. J. Kelso of Toronto, superintendent of the Department of Neglected and Dependent Children. For many years Mr. Kelso has labored to improve the conditions of life for children who are not cared for by their parents. In his last report to the department he declares there should be more stringent legislation for the protection of wives and children. If that is true in Ontario, where they have at least some such legislation, what shall be said of the province of New Brunswick, where children get very little more legal protection than is given to the lower animals. Attempts have been made to secure legislation which would enable someone in authority to take effective action on behalf of neglected and abused children, but without success. If there were today a Children's Aid Society in the city of St. John, with power to act, it would find many opportunities for active intervention on behalf of little ones whose parents are not giving them a fair start in life.

Mr. Kelso makes one suggestion which is of a somewhat radical nature, but which will commend itself to kind-hearted people. It is that the state should provide some aid to widows with young children, to enable them to keep their homes and care for their little ones. If we mistake not this plan has been put in practice in one of the American states. It is a matter of importance to the state whether the children who are growing up are given proper training, and where a widowed mother is willing to do her part she ought not to be left to fight the battle alone.

Another recommendation made by Mr. Kelso is that feeble minded children should be gathered together in classified groups for instruction, and taught some simple industry whereby they might contribute towards their own maintenance. Under our present system, in this province at least, feeble minded children must take their chance in the schools with those of keener intellect, and the results are not satisfactory. All that is required is organization, and the adoption of a system such as is suggested by Mr. Kelso, to give these children a better equipment for life than they are getting under present conditions. Our social organization is still crude in many ways, and there is an inviting field for those who have some time and mind to devote to unselfish service for the good of their less fortunate fellow.

Of these 823,188 were British, 732,129 were from the United States, and 84,049 from continental countries.

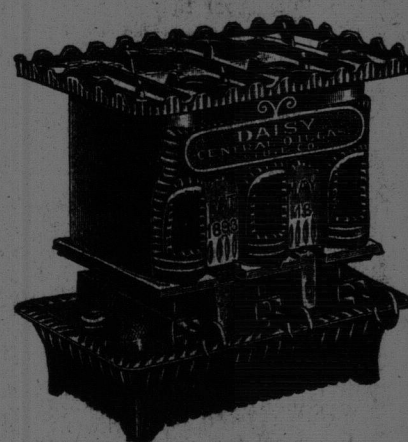

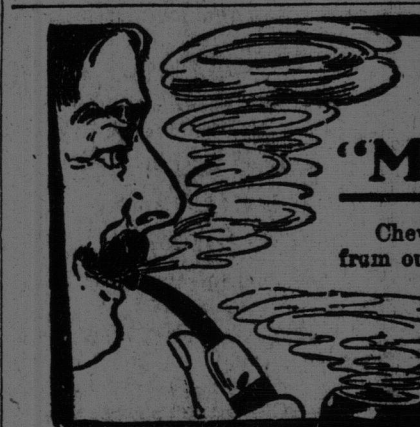

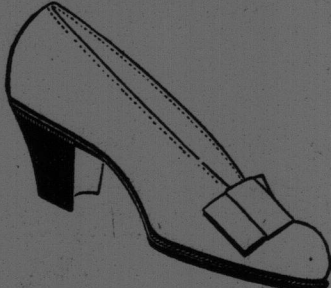
