HENNESSEY WINS SKATING TITLE OF NEW ENGLAND AREA

Lacomb, N. H., Feb. 11.—J. J. Hennessey of Dartmouth College, today won the New England amateur speed skating championship held here under the auspices of the New England Skating Association. The Dartmouth speedster won the three-mile race, the 88 and the 440-yard events and the 220-yard dash, piling up a total of 180 points. By winning the championships for the second successive time, Hennessey gained permanent possession of the Ives-Johnson cup and in winning the 440-yard race in 1:08.4 seconds, he established a New England record.

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
