CLASSY CARD ARRANGED FOR OLYMPIC TOURNAMENT AT THE ARENA TONIGHT

"Fighting Cop" is Billed to Meet Nolan, Maritime Champion, Tonight.

Five classy boxing bouts and four wrestling bouts comprise the programme of the Maritime Olympic boxing and wrestling finals at the Arena tonight and tomorrow night with Maritime champions in every class appearing. The stellar attractions in boxing tonight are the two bouts scheduled for the light weight division, over which Raymond "Nixey" Kennedy presides at present. Kennedy is drawn against Perry, a St. John boy, tonight, while Reg. Harper, colored, baseball star, meets Wilfred of Moncton. Wilfred, who is a former sailor in the British navy, was a last-minute entry and he is rated very good.

Another good bout for tonight's card is the heavy weight go between Polkman Cruikshank, the "Fighting Cop" from Cape Breton, and Dave Nolan, also of Cape Breton, present Maritime 160-pound champion. It has been a long time since two amateur heavyweights mixed matters in a local ring and judging from the talk around town about this bout, it should draw quite a few coppers to the fund to help train these boys for the final tests at Toronto. After the trials here, the boys selected will go into camp at Roshay, according to tentative plans. Chairman "Larry" MacLaren and members of the Olympic committee, feel confident the fans will turn out in large numbers to help out these Maritime boys along. The committee has worked hard to satisfy the fans with the best possible programme and went to all kinds of trouble to secure the entry of Eric Snow, who will meet Louis Donovan, Maritime featherweight champion, tomorrow night.

QUESTIONS

1. With two strikes on him, the batsman struck out at the next delivery, which turned out to be a wild pitch. The umpire called it a ball on the theory that the batsman should have had better sense than to strike at a ball that was so wide of the plate it was impossible to hit. What about it? Can an umpire be removed from the game in the middle of an inning? W. H. I.

2. In retiring a base runner on a touch play, is it necessary that the runner be touched with the naked ball or is it permissible to touch him with the gloved hand that contains the ball? J. O.

3. There is a runner on first base who tries to steal second. The catcher throws the ball into centre field but the runner gets no further than second. The catcher charged with an error? D. C.

ANSWERS

1. The umpire, in making such a decision, was simply paving the way for a riot. The batsman has the right to strike at any ball he desires and when he strikes and misses, it's a strike and the umpire, where the authority of the umpire is limited, it is not unusual for the two captains to agree to a change. If they do, it can be made at any time.

2. It is not necessary to touch a runner with the naked ball. It need only be held in the hand making the touch.

3. The catcher is not charged with an error unless the runner advances an extra base on the bad throw.
