It nearly filled the churn with froth. We have tried it four times with the same result, the cream being the same temperature as before Christmas. Will you or some of your numerous readers please explain?"

Refly:—We have several times, recently, given the remedy for this trouble. It is simply to scald the milk. Immediately after milking strain the milk, and set the vessel containing it in another vessel vessel containing the same very little ultramarine blue and a piece of stearine about the size of a nutmeg, boil two or three minutes longer. Starch the clothes in this, rubbing the starch well into the cloth and polish with a hot iron.




