NOTES AND COMMENTS
WHY THE OF THE INTERESTS ARE OPPOSING RECIPROCITY

From a speech by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Minister of Labor.—Who are the three classes who in particular are opposing reciprocity? I ask this question because, even before I answer it, I want you to bear in mind at all times who they are. Our chief opponents are the bankers, the railroads, and certain financial interests, which expect to benefit if this interchange of natural products can be prevented. The manner in which these combined financial interests which are concerned in packing and kindred industries, borrow money from the banks, consequently, the bankers are tied up with those to whom they lend money. The railways are concerned in transporting the products which these concerns handle.

"Three years ago, a lawsuit growing out of a will contest caused some of the profits of The William Davies Company to be given in open court. Now, what were the profits? Listen, at the end of March, 1893, the company was paying 65 per cent. In 1894 it paid 34 per cent. In 1895 it had gone up again to 40 per cent. The following year it rose to 45 per cent. While in 1897 the return was 100 per cent, and in 1898 it reached the tidy proportion of 120 per cent on the investment.

"I don't mind a man making a fair profit, or even a big profit, if he has something to show for it, and gives the other fellow some kind of a show. But that is just what those who make the loudest cry against reciprocity do not pretend to do in many cases. Between the farmer and consumer has grown up an army of middlemen. It is their activity that accounts for the wide difference between the price received by the producer and the price paid by the consumer. I am thoroughly convinced that this is really the worst thing that Canada has to face at the present time. Do you wonder that men like Mr. Flavelle, of Toronto, are opposed to the tariff? We should smash these combines, and I believe we will. Meanwhile, a reciprocal agreement with the United States would at least hold them in check for some time.

"Consider the situation in regard to canned goods. Year after year, the prices of all canned fruits and vegetables have been steadily mounting. For example, take the particular case of tomatoes. Tomatoes in cans never cost more than they cost at this time and yet never were tomatoes more plentiful. And the canners do not believe in reciprocity. No, I should hardly expect they would.

"If you would see this situation in its full gravity, look at the difference between New York and Montreal. For example, take the particular case of pork. Pork which sells in Montreal for \$26.05 sells the same day in Chicago for \$19.21, yet hams which are selling at \$13.97 in Boston and New York, are commanding \$15.01 in Canadian cities on the same day. Although hogs are lower here, bacon is \$16.01 in Montreal, and \$16.79 in Toronto when it is selling in New York for \$15.07.

WANT A ROAD OUT.
Prince Edward Islanders Wait on Mr. Fielding.

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Sept. 2.—After a hard trip across the straits yesterday, Sir Wilfrid Laurier entered Prince Edward Island and addressed the right honored people in the Arena here. The Premier was cordially received.

A deputation informally waited upon Hon. Mr. Fielding at Georgetown, urging the Minister of Finance to make arrangements for the improvement of communication between the island and the mainland, in order, they said, that the islanders might secure the full advantage of the service to the New England States in exporting their fish, potatoes and farm products under the operation of the reciprocity agreement.

"As in the United States," said the Premier, "so here in Canada, reciprocity is opposed by the trusts, monopolies and special interests. But we have the people, our fellow-countrymen, at our back from one end of the country to the other."

From Montague to Charlottetown the Premier traveled over the Prince Edward Island Railway, arriving here for the big meeting last night. At every station on route he was accorded demonstrations. Special trains had run from all parts of the island and had to leave passengers at nearly every station for lack of accommodation.

C. A. Osborn, who is said to have been leading a Jekyll and Hyde life in Montreal, is declared to have left suddenly for Europe, leaving his bride-to-be waiting at the church.

Free ocean liners will sail for Canada this week, carrying passengers only. None are able to load freight, as a result of the strike conditions.

Paris, Sept. 1.—Theophile Homolle, director of the National Museum, yesterday in consequence of the disappearance of Leonardo Da Vinci's painting, "Mona Lisa," from the Louvre. It was the opinion of the members of the Ministry that M. Homolle took insufficient precautions to guard the treasures in the museum.

Candidates Sign Agreement.
Chatham, Sept. 1.—The campaign in West Kent over the question of reciprocity is growing in interest. B. H. candidates have signed an agreement that they will conduct an absolutely clean campaign, and a joint fund of \$1,000 has been deposited for the purpose of prosecuting any person on either side who is found guilty of bringing the election into disrepute.

FRENCH FOOD RIOTS

Disturbances Occur in Thirty or Forty Towns.

SPREADING TO THE SOUTH

At Douai the Populace Parade With Banners Inscribed "Butter at 30 Sous or Revolution"—Shops Are Pillaged by Women Who Demand Lower Prices on the Necessaries of Life.

Paris, Sept. 1.—A campaign which has for its purpose a reduction of the high prices of food was started yesterday in Paris.

Ten taxicabs, the occupants carrying devices on which were inscribed demands that the cost of necessities be lowered, paraded through the Champs Elysee and other thoroughfares.

Open agitation, with some violence, is going on in thirty or forty towns and cities in the northern departments, and the movement is spreading to other parts of France.

Energetic demonstrations are being held at Orleans, the capital of the department of Loiret.

At Douai, department of Nord, banners bearing the inscription "butter at thirty sous or revolution," were borne in a procession of 2,000 persons, mostly women, here yesterday. They marched the manifestos sang revolutionary hymns.

At Lille, the general confederation of labor has taken up the agitation. Six thousand metal workers voiced their protest yesterday by parading through the streets.

Serious riots over the price of food occurred in St. Quentin last night. The mob pillaged several butcher stores and set fire to one of them, in spite of the efforts of the police.

Ban on Joy Riding.
Toronto, Sept. 1.—Expulsion from the Ontario Motor League is threatened by the directors as a penalty for reckless driving on the part of the members.

They have decided to send a circular to all their members, asking that they drive carefully and that they report any cases of reckless and dangerous driving which may come under their notice. The league has always favored and advocated careful driving.

E. A. James, engineer, has reported to the league that three-fourths of the work of improving York County roads would be finished by the end of 1912.

Planing Factory Burned.
Lindsay, Sept. 1.—Yesterday morning the planing factory of the Gulf River Lumber Co. at Lindsay was totally destroyed by fire. The cause was a defective chimney. The loss is estimated at over \$10,000. A Grand Trunk car on the siding was partly destroyed.

New Auto Badly Burned.
Acton, Sept. 1.—A new automobile was caused Wednesday night when a new auto owned by Mr. Fred Storey, of the W. H. Storey & Sons Co., was destroyed by fire. The car was a 1910 model, which was running on the road, dropped a match on some recently spilled gasoline. The car is almost a total loss.

Schooner Burned at Sea.
New York, Sept. 1.—Wireless reports received here yesterday afternoon from the steamer Oklahoma, bound from New York to Port Arthur, Texas, tell of the burning of an unidentified schooner at sea yesterday and a full cargo, by the Oklahoma for the crew of the doomed vessel.

Burglars Used a Wagon.
Montreal, Sept. 1.—Burglars, who broke into the premises of Gailbault Brothers, St. Lawrence, Wednesday night by the front door, opened a rear door, and backing a wagon up loaded it heavily with merchandise, including tinware, etc., to the value of \$500.
