GUELPH, May 11.—As the result of a collision on the Grant Trunk at Gourock last September between a fruit special and a passenger train, in which three lives were lost, Conductor Joseph Thompson, who was in charge of the fruit special, was today sentenced to three years in Kingston penitentiary by Judge Riddell.

The judge, addressing Thompson, said: "I am unable to see the slightest sign of repentance on your part. Instead of repentance for your own crime, you seek to cast all blame upon others. For your own hake, then, I must cause some substantial punishment to be inflicted.

"You know you had, under the rules, a rest of eight hours. Once you had worked sixteen hours, and there can be no doubt that you continued on the route because of its remunerative character. You stoutly asserted that you had plenty of sleep.

"To my mind, the persons who permitted you to work nineteen and twenty hours a day for five days a week were guilty of gross wrong, and I shall recommend to the crown authorities that the persons responsible no matter what their position be proceeded against so far as the criminal law permits
